Lee Bennett of Corvallis Passes

Corvallis, July 13 (AP)—Lee Bennett, for 18 years manager of the Corvallis office of the Mountain States Power company, died suddenly Monday afternoon at the beach home of Dr. R. L. Bosworth, at Ten Mile. He suffered a heart difficulty several months ago and had never fully recovered.

Mr. Bennett was a graduate of the University of Idaho at Moscow and lived at Sand Point until the family came to Corvallis. He married Opal Wright, who survives him with one daughter, Juanita, in Corvallis, and one son, Major Donald Bennett, chief of staff to General Davies at San Angelo, Texas. His mother, Mrs. Frances Bennett, resides at Sandpoint, and there is one brother, John Bennett, in government work in Alaska.

Axis Sees Allies Taking Big Risks

Stockholm, July 13 (AP)—Rome dispatches to Swedish newspapers said today Italian commentators had admitted that the allied invasion forces in Sicily were driving toward Messina but at "great risk."

Stockholm's Tidningen quoted a spokesman as declaring that the allies are "playing for very high stakes." Alessandro Pavolini, Italy's former propaganda minister, answering Italians who are asking how it was possible that the allies could land on Sicily in such force in view of Premier Mussolini's recent invasion speech in which he was quoted as declaring they would be stopped at the sea, advised them "not to take Mussolini's words too literally," the paper said.

While the Italian press and commentators were taking a serious view of developments in Sicily, dispatches to the Swedish press from Berlin described German spokesmen as being "optimistic."

Stockholm's Tidningen said Berlin asserted that "practically speaking," the American troops have been "liquidated," although a few American detachments are fighting in "hopeless positions."

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Post-war Bridge Finance Planned

Members of the county court Tuesday afternoon met at Dallas in discussion with the Polk county court as to what proposition will be made to the state highway commission here next Saturday as to what steps the two counties will take toward paying their respective shares into a reserve for a new inter-county bridge over the Willamette river at Independence as a post-war project.

Tentatively the plan is for each of the counties to pay one-eighth of the cost of the structure, or a fourth of it between them. This would leave the other three-fourths to be borne by the state and federal governments.

The present estimated cost of such a bridge is \$300,000 which would mean that Polk and Marion counties would each pay \$37,500 into the project, this money to be set aside in a sinking fund for the purpose. It is expected that Independence and Salem people interested in the project will also be at Tuesday afternoon's meeting.

Jimmy Donegan Passes at Burns

James J. (Jimmy) Donegan, dean of the third house of the Oregon legislature on which he has been in regular attendance for more than 30 years as a representative of the timber interests, died in Burns as a result of a stroke last night and will be buried in that city Thursday morning, according to word received by Douglas Mularky, secretary to Governor Snell.

Donegan, tax agent for the Hines Lumber company of late years and a former assessor of Harney county, of which he had been a resident for more than 50 years, has been one of the legislative lobby for many years. Besides representing timber interests he has been actively identified with the reclamation movement in Oregon.

His wife, the first white child born in Harney county, died several years ago, but he is survived by a son, Richard H. Donegan, graduate of Willamette university and a practicing attorney at Burns, and two daughters, one residing in Burns and the other in Portland.

Two Northwest Men Get Flying Cross

Allied Headquarters in Australia, July 13 (AP)—Two men from the northwest have been awarded the distinguished flying cross by Lieut. Gen. George C. Kenney, commander of allied air forces in the Southwest Pacific.

The awards were based on amassed flying time in bombers in action against the Japanese. The men were First Lieut. Charles L. Anderson, Portland, Ore., and Staff Sgt. Harold J. Leamaster, Buhl, Idaho.
