

Permanent Dam for Silverton City Water Supply

Mayor Offers Deciding Vote

Silverton—"To be or not to be" called for the deciding vote of Mayor Reber Allen last night when, for the first time since the new council set-up, there was a deadlock in votes. The question at stake was decision concerning the Abiqua dam for the Silverton water supply. The dam went out last winter when the water was in flood and since then the city has been supplied by a pumping system at the dam site at a cost of more than \$400 a month.

Voting for the dam were Ernest L. Starr, who made the motion which was seconded by Alderman John W. Jordan, Jordan and George Christenson. Definitely against the dam as planned by the city manager were luster "no's" by Jonas Byberg, Tom Anderson and Ernest Boesch. Mayor Allen explained that he was a member of the city council when the other dam was built as a temporary structure, and contended that if the dam had been of lasting material the loss would not have occurred last winter. He cast his vote for the building of the dam.

The contention was caused because of the present labor and material situation, and Byberg felt that a temporary structure was sufficient. The cost of the dam and initial pipe needs was figured at around \$42,000, compared to \$9000 for the temporary dam.

Starr's motion also passed that had to do with favoring an alternate bid, providing the cost of construction was within reason.

Then again, the jitters seemed to come to the discussion surface in worry of what the conditions are going to be for the citizens, his water supply, and other needs, when and if the Silver Falls mill leaves the town high and dry.

Concerning the life of the mill's working days here, Alderman Tom Anderson announced: "A man in the know said the mill would go down after the war as soon as it began to run in the red," and this apparently, determined the vote of "No" for Anderson on favoring a mere temporary dam for the water supply. Others felt that Silverton could and would go ahead and always need water.

Manager Burton explained as to the financing the costs of the dam that no bonds would need to be floated for the initial cost. That in eighteen months it could and would be paid out, and as a grand finale to a long evening, the losers said this was a democracy we were living in and the deciding vote suited them, and no hard feelings.

Two houses in town are considered a menace to the safety to North Water street residents in the Custer Ross property that is in bad shape, and the residence place next to the KP hall.

Resolutions were passed waiving interest and accepting an agreed settlement on street assessments on Sunset Home property on Mill street, the George Hubbs home on Apple avenue, the Norris Ames property in Jersey street and certain properties of the Coolidge estate. A lot in Geosier addition may be sold for \$200 to the Olson family. The city budget was adopted as no objections were presented. The city dog pound was reported a success as no dogs were incarcerated.

European Leaflets Have Strong Demand

Silverton—New contributions to the city library for patrons are bulletins or leaflets on current items of international interest from Washington, D. C., concerning happenings in Russia, Czechoslovakia, Australia, Norway and Denmark.

These bulletins come weekly ordinarily. Because of Silverton being a large per cent Norwegian, the leaflet describing certain occurrences from their native land is proving of intense interest.

In the first messages from Norway were stories of such subjects as "Ninety-two German Planes Shot Down by Norse Airmen," "More Prisoners Sent to Germany from Nearby Concentration Camp," "Nazis Seize Hostages," "King Haakon Received Swedish Minister," "Here and There in Norway," and "Hunger Tightens Around Groups in Norway." Stories in other bulletins are of equal interest to the native-born or relatives of persons in those countries. The reading of the leaflets are free to patrons.
