Silverton—Combining the annual Christmas party for veterans' kiddies with an educational and song program, Clifton Dickerson, commander of Delbert Reeves post No. 7, was official host to members of the auxiliary of which Mrs. F. 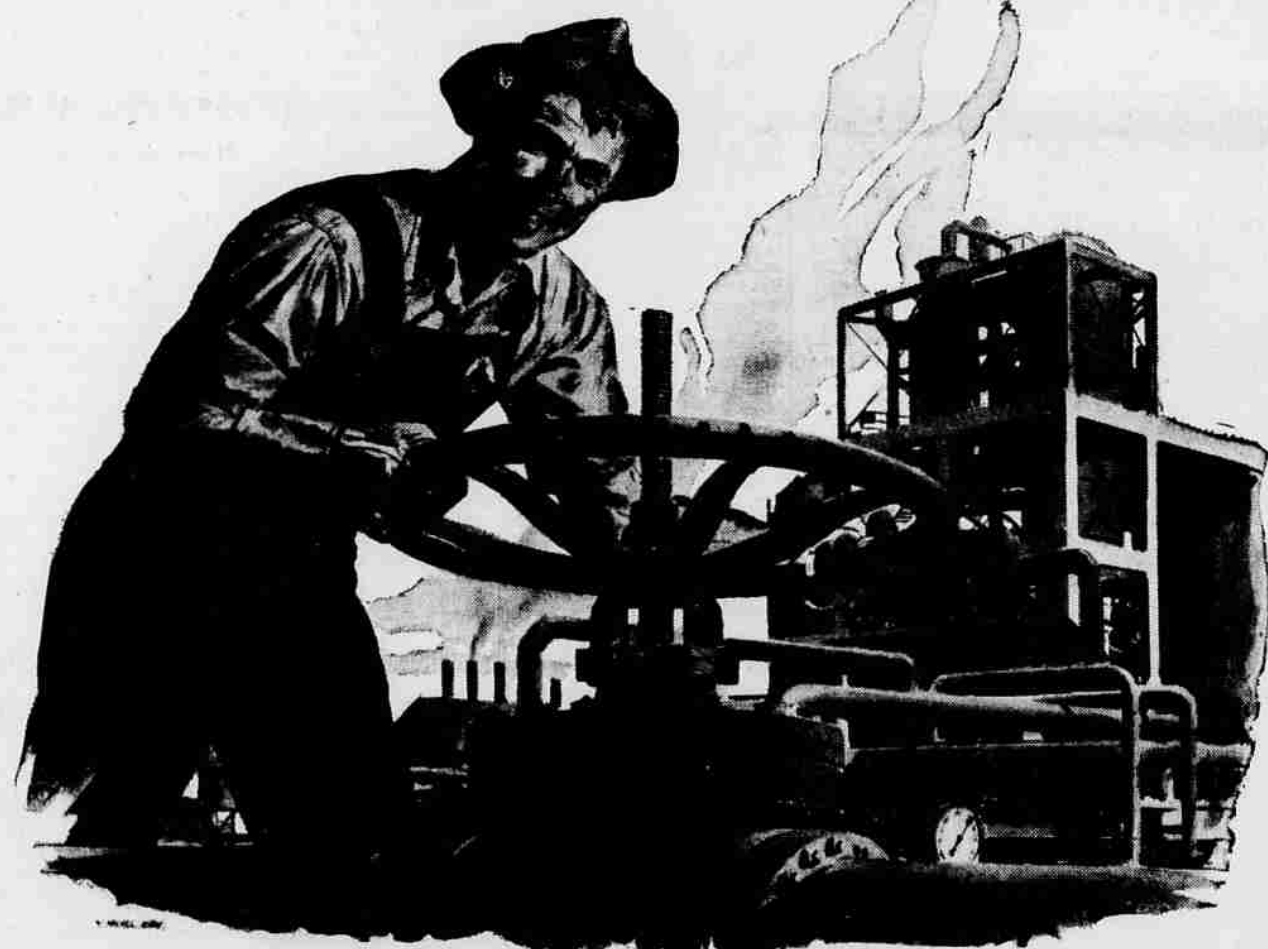
