Colored Troops Fight Police

Las Vegas, Nev., Jan. 13 (U.P.)—An altercation Sunday between negro troops and police in which one soldier was killed was blamed by Las Vegas authorities today for the temporary off limits restrictions placed on the city by Maj. Gen. Alexander Patch. One negro soldier was killed and three were wounded in the shooting affray when some 300 negroes from Camp Clapper, Calif., became boisterous and rioted against local and military police who attempted to quiet them. City officials expected the

wholesale order to be revoked when a thorough investigation had been completed. Police said the trouble started when the troops arrived early Sunday morning and "took over" a section of the colored district. They brought with them a large stock of liquor, and police were finally called to quell the disturbance. The troops disarmed the officers and then fired on additional police when they arrived. In the melee that followed, one officer was grazed by a bullet and four negroes were shot, one fatally. Police rounded up the troops and bayonet-equipped soldiers from the Las Vegas air station escorted them out of town. City officials said they had understood colored troops were the only ones to be restricted as

other service personnel had conducted themselves as gentlemen and were fully welcomed by the city.

Arab Nearly Upset Invasion

New York, Jan. 13 (U.P.)—An Arab who saw Gen. Mark W. Clark land on a beach near Algiers one night in October, 1942, almost upset the general's mission to pave the way for the allied landing in North Africa the following month, Capt. Andre Maurois, French author, revealed today. The Arab, hidden on the beach in the darkness, watched Clark and his party, who had arrived offshore in a submarine, land in two canoes, meet French officers and repair to a nearby villa to confer on invasion plans, Maurois said in a town hall address.

Believing the whole thing was a smuggling operation, the Arab went to the Vichy police in Algiers the next day and reported the incident. But an anti-Vichy coast guard officer, according to Maurois, saved the day by going to police headquarters and putting all police cars and motorcycles out of commission. By the time a police inspector arrived at the villa, Maurois said, the conference was over, and the owner of the villa diverted suspicion by saying: "It's true that something happened here last night. Two American consuls came here with two ladies, but one of these is the daughter of a very high official, and I don't think it would be good for your career to be involved in this."

Cooperation With Canada Permanent

Washington, Jan. 13 (AP)—President Roosevelt said Wednesday that the United States is determined that cooperation between this country and Canada "will continue in the peace to come for the benefit of both our peoples and the world in general."

The president told Leighton McCarthy, recently raised to the rank of Canadian ambassador, that United States collaboration with Canada in the war has "unlocked the doors to economic co-operation continental in scope for prosecution of the common cause."

McCarthy, Canadian minister to Washington for three years, became ambassador upon the recent agreement between this country and Canada to raise the rank of their representative.

McCarthy presented his credentials just before a meeting in the White House cabinet room of the Pacific war council. He told President Roosevelt

that the industrial and fighting strength of the United States and Canada "have been coordinated in a manner never surpassed by two neighboring states. This collaboration in war is, I am confident, an earnest of our determination to work together in the peace that will follow our common victory."

Mr. Roosevelt said in reply, "in Italy as in the Aleutians, in the skies of Europe as, later, in the skies of Asia, and on all the oceans our comradeship in arms will have forged enduring bonds in the struggle against mutual enemies both east and west."

Funeral Held At Camp Adair

Camp Adair, Jan. 13—The first formal military funeral held in Camp Adair, Saturday marked the last rites for Warrant Officer (J.G.) William Gribben of the 91st division. Maj. Gen. William G. Livesay, division commander, and the officers and enlisted men of the division headquarters where Mr. Gribben worked, attended the ceremony—one of the most impressive in the army.

The funeral began with a brief service in the special troops chapel. Then as the division band played the funeral march, the solemn procession moved toward the west gate where the final rites were performed. A platoon of riflemen fired three volleys in the air. The bugler blew taps while the group stood at attention. As he ended, the hearse moved out of camp. The body was transported to Porterville, Calif., Mr. Gribben's home.

Mr. Gribben dropped dead as the result of a sudden heart attack as he entered his office. He is survived by a sister.

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
