

Officers Seated By Dallas PTA

Dallas—Officers for the coming year were installed and annual reports read at the last association meeting of the Dallas PTA for the school year, held this week at the high school auditorium.

With Mrs. Genevieve Beharrel acting as installing officer, the following newly-elected officers were installed: Mrs. Raleigh Middleton, president; A. V. Waters, first vice president; Mrs. G. J. Scott, secretary; Mrs. Adrian Sias, treasurer, and Mrs. Norman Baker, auditor.

Vic Waters, chairman for the youth recreation program, expressed his satisfaction with the project in a report, and asked for \$65 monthly to keep the facilities of the center in operation during the summer months if continued participation of the young people made it feasible. Following his discussion, Mrs. Raleigh Middleton, president, stated that insurance to cover the property, valued at \$1,000, should be provided, and appointed Waters to attend to the matter.

Mrs. P. J. Walton, reporting on the hot lunch project in the school, stated that the average income per month was \$650, and the expenses approximately \$600. Between 250 and 300 children ate hot lunches daily, she said. To secure further financial aid for the project, Mrs. Middleton urged members to write to congressmen asking for their support in the passage of bill S-1824, pertaining to the matter.

In a talk on taxation, dealing principally with school support, Donald Gabbert, high school principal, stated that petitions are now being circulated in Dallas which propose a constitutional amendment to increase the state tax fund for public school support. The petition, initiated by the Oregon State Teachers' association, would take more income tax funds for school support and lessen the property tax burden proportionately.

Reports on the state PTA convention in Portland were given by Mrs. G. J. Scott and Mrs. Max Graves, delegates from the local organization.

Announcement was made of the concert to be given at the Christian church by Mrs. Josephine Albert Spaulding late this month under the sponsorship of the Dallas Woman's club, proceeds of which will be used for the recreation center.

Mrs. Conn Murray announced a shoe sale for May 27, stating that over 400 pairs of shoes were available for the sale.

The group voted to sponsor a Camp Fire organization and provided the \$5 fee necessary to start the work. Musical numbers for the program were furnished by the high school double quartet under the direction of Mrs. Mary Martin Bradley, music instructor of the Dallas schools.
