Carrier Pilot Group Tells Of Amazing Bombing Record

Pearl Harbor, T. H., May 13 (AP)—A group of pleasant, quietly destructive young men, homeward bound to the mainland after five to 18 months duty aboard American carriers, today revealed an amazing record of major victories over Hirohito's land, sea and air forces reading like a bluebook of American triumphs in the Pacific war.

Youthful group commanders, and even more youthful fighter, torpedo and bomber pilots of the 5th, 23rd and 30th air groups told their story of the Pacific attack at a press conference here while awaiting transportation home.

They revealed that their units—only a capsule of the total carrier plane strength under Adm. Chester W. Nimitz' command—have sunk 113,000 tons of enemy shipping, shot down

186 enemy aircraft and destroyed at least 187 other planes around, as a sideline to their major job of protecting U. S. warships and landing forces during a historic series of raids and invasions.

Their story begins with the 5th air group's entry into action on the Marcus island raid last Sept. 1, the 23rd first battle at Makin island Sept. 18, and the 30th's initiation at the Gilberts and Makin the following day. It continues through their joint participation in the second pulverizing attack on Japan's "Pearl Harbor" base of Truk April 30.

Group five, working from a huge Essex-type carrier, has been in every Pacific action except the raids on Rabaul from the time of its first raid on Marcus last September through the second Truk attack.

The Chinese acknowledged the loss of Mienchi on the Lungkai railway 42 miles west of Loyal to a Japanese column which had struck southward across the Yellow river from Shansi province. A spokesman previously had said Mienchi "may have fallen." The high command already had acknowledged the loss of Ying-hao, six miles farther west.

The loss of Mienchi appreciably lessened the chance of Chinese troops in Honan province to fight their way out along the Lungkai railway, their main escape route.

Another Japanese column from the north was reported striking in the direction of the railway town of Kuanyintang, whose loss would place the invaders only 75 miles from Tungkuang, gateway to China's great northwest.

The course of the battle was being viewed with increasing alarm in Chungking as it was realized a Japanese drive on Tungkuang would be fraught with grave implications.

Information from a store in West Salem that a certain radio had been bought from the youth led to his arrest at a skating rink. This radio and \$46 in money were taken from the Hansen & Liljequist planing mill office the night of April 20. The two boys were together on this job. They divided the money and the younger boy exchanged the radio in West Salem for \$6 and a 22-caliber rifle. Later he sold the rifle back for \$6 or \$7, he said.

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Realtors Told Pension Plan

Arguments in favor of the proposed retirement plan for members of the Salem fire department were presented to the Salem Board of Realtors Friday noon by Ellsworth Smith of the central station. The speaker pointed out that a number of firemen will soon reach the age where they can no longer work with efficiency and some plan should be devised whereby they can retire.

The retirement plan calls for 30 years of service for the beneficiary who will contribute \$10 a month toward the fund. This will be matched by \$10,000 by the city the first year. This contribution is expected to increase yearly until it reaches a maximum of \$20,000 in about 20 years. After that it should fall to around \$12,000. Upon retirement, each fireman will receive \$75 a month. Widows of comparable age to their husbands will draw two-thirds of the amount.

Provision is made for firemen who are killed while in line of duty. The administering body will include the mayor, city recorder, treasurer, fire chief and two men to be selected by the firemen.

Japs Isolate Chinese Army

Chungking, May 13 (AP)—Barring the main retreat line for several hundred thousand Chinese troops, the Japanese driving down from Shansi have cut the Lungkai railway at least at two points more than 40 miles west of beleaguered Loyal, it was disclosed today.

Field dispatches reported heavy fighting on the outskirts of Loyal and the Japanese were said to be using 200 tanks in an attempt to storm the city.

Douglas Yeater was named war bond chairman for Marion county Saturday, it was announced by E. C. Sammons, chairman, Oregon war finance committee.

Yeater has been active in war bond selling throughout the war financing campaign and takes the new position of leadership with a full background of experience.

Plans are under way to launch Marion county into the fifth war loan, which is scheduled for June 12 to July 8. Marion county has a good record in past war loan drives, having topped its fourth war loan quota by 135.7 percent.

Oregon's quota in the fifth war loan is considerably higher than previous drives, having been set at \$123 million. Marion county's quota has not yet been announced but will be somewhat heavier than heretofore, according to Yeater.

"The Oregon war finance committee considers itself fortunate to secure the services of a man with the experience and ability of Mr. Yeater," Sammons stated.

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
