He said that if the doctors believe, after X-rays are taken that he will be in shape again for combat in six months, he'll stay in England. Otherwise he will probably be sent home soon.

American Seamen To Need Passports

Washington, July 13 (AP)—Effective November 15, American seamen will not be able to ship out of the United States for a foreign port without a passport.

By August 15, the state department announced today, seamen must have either a passport or evidence that they have applied for one within the preceding six months.

The order was issued by the secretary of state "in order that the interest of the United States and its merchant marine may be safeguarded by every possible means."

The department also said the regulation meets legal requirements that all Americans leaving the country have passports. Seamen had been exempted to

expedite the wartime shipping program.
