

Lebanon Nut Crop Heavy

Lebanon, Sept. 21—One of the largest nut crops on record here, valued at a quarter million dollars, will be handled by the Lebanon Nut Growers association plant, reported E. B. Edes, secretary of the association.

Picking and hauling to the plant for processing is expected to start about October 1 for filberts and the middle of October for walnuts. About 250 tons each is expected to be handled by the local plant.

The complete processing of filberts, including drying, grading and preparing for shipment, will be taken care of here. However, until the building that was destroyed by fire can be replaced after the war, only drying of walnuts is possible and they will be taken elsewhere for grading and shipment preparations.

While no ceiling price has yet been announced by OPA for walnuts, the prevailing price of last year, varying from 25½ cents to 33 cents per pound, is expected to be in effect.

Filberts, however, will not an additional \$69 increase over last year, making the price \$509 per ton.

The yield of walnuts will be heavy, according to advance reports, said Edes, although filberts will be about 60 percent of average yield. The total amount of filberts to be handled will be greater than last year because of an increase in the number of growers and sizes of orchards.

Nuts grown not only in this immediate vicinity but also from areas extending into southern Oregon are handled by the local plant.
