Octopus Romances in Tank Ends in Triple Tragedy

Seattle, Oct. 13 (AP)—Death struck for the second and third time in the octopus tank of a Seattle aquarium today, as pert eight-armed Emily avenged the strangling of her 35-pound lover, "Little Joe," by draining the 1000-gallon tank, killing Oscar, hulking accused cephalopod, and herself.

The public was immediately barred from the aquarium when it was discovered that grief-stricken Emily had pulled out the drainage plug. Her lissome form, light tan in death, lay sprawled beside the outlet, three of her tentacles still clutching the stopper. Ten yards away, gasping out his mis-spent life, was Oscar, the strangler.

Details of the suicide and mass murder were slow in coming from owner Ivar Haglund, still numbed by the original loss of "Little Joe."

"I knew all along it was Oscar that killed Little Joe," Haglund admitted to members of the naval shore patrol attracted by crowds outside the locked aquarium doors. "But I didn't want the public thinking I was exhibiting a murder. And I wasn't sure which one Emily loved."

Graphically he told of last night's battle to the death, during which Emily sat helpless while the game "Little Joe," the cherry red with anger, attempted to block "that no good Oscar" from molesting his love. Poles in the hands of attendants failed to break up the furious battle, and it was not until 15 minutes later that Oscar was driven back to a corner of the tank. By that time it was too late. Little Joe was dead.

No one knows what happened last night. But Haglund is convinced that Emily slowly realized it was Little Joe she loved. "She wasn't much more than a debutante, but how that young lady must have loved."

This morning, despite double guards, Emily reached her decision. She unleashed the waters of the tank. And Oscar, still slumbering, paid for his submarine crimes.

Services will be held Saturday, October 14, at 1:30 p.m. from the W. T. Rigdon company chapel with Dr. Henry Marcotte officiating. Concluding services will be at the Mt. Crest Abbey Mausoleum and Crematorium.

Labor Groups Truce Ending

Washington, Oct. 13 (AP)—The AFL and CIO, losers together in the war labor board's decision to give President Roosevelt no recommendation on easing wage controls, may start swinging at each other again before the year is over.

Despite the ostensible unanimity of the AFL and CIO members on the board, there are some important differences in their positions.

Their association is more formal than intimate. Feelings run deep into the stratum of politics, labor-wise and nationally. There have been no personal recriminations so far, but they may come after the election. The gap in the labor movement is widening.

On the surface, two groups of labor leaders clamored for a liberalization of the little steel wage policy and both suffered equally by the WLB action in taking a non-committal position, but there is more to it. CIO President Philip Murray is in the position of having assured his members more than three weeks ago that the little steel formula would be revised soon.

He is in the position of publicly advocating the candidacy of President Roosevelt and hence has risked some personal prestige in a labor movement that is already divided. He has specific contract disputes before the WLB involving large amounts of retroactive pay which might be lost to his members if the wage formula went unchanged until the reconversion period. Murray antagonists wisecrack that the CIO members have already spent the retroactive pay.

Mrs. Walton, Teacher, Dies

Teacher in the Salem schools for many years and in the Coquille, Oregon, schools for the past 15 years, Mrs. Edith Campbell Walton, died Thursday at a local hospital, where she had been confined following a recent stroke.

The daughter of D. F. Campbell, whose home state was Kentucky, and Martha Baker Campbell, who was born at Turner, Oregon, Mrs. Walton was born at Stayton, Oregon, December 21, 1884. In 1919 she was married to W. H. Walton who preceded her in death a number of years ago. A member of the Oregon State Teachers' association for many years, Mrs. Campbell was also an active member of the Coquille Business and Professional Women's club.

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Friday the 13th Unluckiness Only Wheezy Superstition

New York, Oct. 13 (AP)—Of course it's just superstition that Friday, or the 13th of the month, or Friday the 13th, is unlucky. It's just an old wheeze like "Friday's a dry day" or—Hm.

But what does that prove about the 13th?

Well, the records show that an earthquake in Ecuador killed 200 on May 13, 1942, and a mine disaster at Cherry, Ill., claimed 239 lives on Nov. 13, 1909.

It was on Dec. 13, 1941, that Hungary and Bulgaria declared war on the United States—an unlucky day for Hungary and Bulgaria—and on May 13, 1940, that the Netherlands forces capitulated to the Germans.

The first blood of the American Revolution was shed at Westminster, Vt., on March 13, 1775, and the United States declared war on Mexico on May 13, 1846. Long before the 13th amendment abolished slavery, 13 slaves were put to death in New York.
