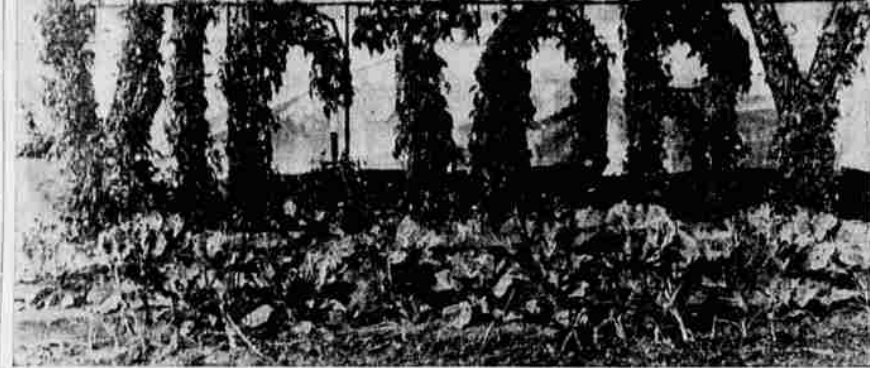

Dallas Students Top Bond Quota

Dallas—Members of the Dallas high school student body have raised \$340.24 to top their \$325 war chest fund quota and swell to \$557 the amount contributed by schools of the city. William Blackley, Dallas chest chairman, announced Friday.

Spurred by their slogan, "A dollar for every star in the service flag," adopted at the suggestion of Blackley, leaders of the school campaign early in the week tackled the job of soliciting a dollar from every member of the student body, which numbers about 325, the approximate number of stars in the school service flag. When, after the \$200 mark was passed, contributions began to lag, campaign leaders, fearful they fail to attain the goal, called upon high school organizations to meet the deficit. Last minute donations of the Girls Athletic club, Lettermen's club, Hi-Y, senior and junior classes, the student body organization and various individuals put them over the top with \$15.24 to spare. Last year, the high school contributed \$192.37 to the war chest fund.

Contributions to the fund from the three Dallas schools now standing at \$557 includes \$40 from the junior high school, \$32 from the elementary building and \$145 from the teachers.

Non-Suit Declared In Accident Trial

Dallas — A motion for involuntary non suit made by Francis Marsh, defense attorney in the auto damage case of Travis vs. Newman was granted in circuit court Thursday afternoon by Judge Arlie G. Walker.

The plaintiff, Lea Travis, charging defendant with gross negligence, was seeking general damages of \$15,000 and \$79.65 special damages for injuries alleged received in an automobile accident resulting while she was a passenger in the automobile driven by John Newman. The accident occurred in a public street in Salem according to the complaint. The plaintiff placed the blame on the defendant, claiming he was physically incapacitated.

Attorney for the plaintiff was Bruce Spaulding of Salem.

Armistice Day Sermon Given

Silverton—"God made man a master through combat," was the theme idea developed in the Armistice day talk by Rev. Russell Myers in his annual tribute to the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion and their auxiliaries as a religious gesture last night at the First Christian church.

The speaker read his text from Micah, fourth chapter, and announced his subject, "Sublimating the Fighting Instinct." He attributed the complete lethargy and pacifism following the World War I, as the cause of this world conflict, and specified the needs of continual fighting to keep a peace with the use of force in a program of Christian sharing. He deplored curtailing production to create higher prices. He warned against "unpatriotic pressure groups among us and at work now," and approved the truth that the glory of war is gone.

Supplemental musical numbers included group singing of hymns led by Mrs. John W. Jordan with Mrs. G. W. Enbusk at the piano; vocal solo, "How Lovely Are Thy Dwellings," Liddle, by Mrs. W. P. Scarth, accompanied by Mrs. Enbusk; cello solos, "Still as the Night," Behn, by K. V. Hineckley, assisted at the piano by Mrs. Walter C. Larson.

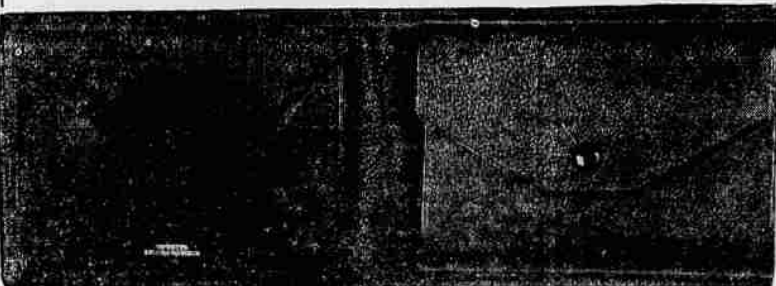
The regular Bible study hour in charge of the Men's Sunday school class will be a program feature of the reception. All members and friends are welcome to attend.
