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without gain two miles from Calcar, but Scotch troops of Gen. Henry Crozer's command cut the Goch-Udem railroad near the smoking ruins of Goch and pressed to within 4000 yards of Udem itself.

Indications were that the Germans were striving to hold a new defense line on a 150-foot ridge between Calcar and Udem, the last bit of high ground short of the lower Rhine. Beyond Goch, the British and Scots Welsh and Canadians emerged into an open plain ideal for tanks.

After being wounded the captain was sent to an army hospital in England and on October 4, 1944, was to have been released from the hospital and sent back to active duty, when a lung infection was discovered. He was sent to another hospital and here had an operation in which one lung was removed.

The American embassy explained that the proposal never mentioned Algiers as such but only a warship off the North African coast, presumably near Algiers. Caffery did meet the president of Algiers.

Roosevelt intended, embassy officials said, to return to Washington as soon as possible and then make a ceremonial state visit to France and England in the late spring after the United Nations conference in San Francisco.

The Third army was through or inside the Siegfried line along its entire 55-mile active front. Gains of a half mile to a mile narrowed the gap between breaks in the line at Priem and Ebernach to barely 12 miles. Planes attacked six fortified villages in the Saar valley between Saarburg and Merzig.

German losses were extremely heavy in the Saar-Moselle triangle, where second class enemy troops failed to stand up to the terrific force of the attack. More than 2500 Germans have surrendered in the past 48 hours to the Third army alone; the Canadians in the north captured 1000 overnight for a 14-day total of more than 10,000.

The Canadian army was held in place by the Third army.

Following announcement of WPR authorization by C. T. Mudge, district priorities chief in Portland, Norman Kelley, president of Kelley-Farguhar, headquarters at Tacoma, said that all details of construction would be handled by Kane in Salem. Frank G. Myers, Veteran Restaurant Man Passes

Frank G. Myers, patriarch of Salem retail businessmen and owner of the Spa restaurant from 1911 until June 1944, when he sold it to Robert M. Lehman and Charles A. Johnston, died this morning at the Salem General hospital of a heart ailment that had caused him to be taken to the hospital over a month ago. Born in Old Clay, Pa., Mr. Myers with his parents, David S. and Clara Weaver Myers came to Salem to make his home about 1880. He received his early education in the east and continued his studies in the Salem public schools, graduating from the Capital City Business college.

For two years Myers worked in the merchandising place of Robert Craig at Macleay and in 1899 came to Salem to seek employment. He applied for a position with the Salem Stool Bottling works and was given the job of washing soap bottles in the basement of the factory. A few months later he was promoted to an upstairs job and the was asked by Mr. Stolz to go to the Spa to help his son, Walter, who established the Spa in 1891.

Myers was to work at the restaurant during the holiday season, but was asked to remain at the Spa a few months longer. After eight or 10 months he was given an interest in the business with Mrs. Lenta Westcott, Walter's sister, advancing the money for a fifth interest. From time to time he acquired a little more until in 1911 after he had become manager and half owner of the store he bought out the Stolz interest.

On August 7, 1897, Myers was married to May Priest of Mapleton, Iowa, who survives him. He was a member of Salem Elks Lodge and of the Chettrian.

Surviving besides his wife are two children, Maxine Claggert and Deryl F. Myers, both of Salem; three grandchildren, Marilyn Frances and Robert Franklin Myers and Patricia May Claggert, all of Salem; four sisters, Maybelle Brown of Salem, Benah Hadden of Arlington, Ore., Effie Mae Blower of La Canada, Calif., and Bertha Blair of Portland and two brothers, O. V. Myers of Medford and Oliver Myers of Salem.

Announcement of funeral services will be made later by W. T. Rigdon company.

Funeral services will be held at the home of her son-in-law, Charles Mattson, and granddaughter, Miss Frances Mattson, of a heart ailment that became serious only last Friday.

Born in Denmark, December 21, 1859, Mrs. Pederson came to the United States 64 years ago. May 9, 1915, she, with her husband, came to Salem to make her home. She was united in marriage to Anton Pederson, who died in November, 1926. One daughter, the late Christina Pederson Mattson was born to the couple.

Mrs. Pederson was a member of the Emmanuel Baptist church.

Surviving are four grandchildren, Mrs. Lillian Frann, and Sylvia, Frances and Henry Mattson, all of Salem; two great grandchildren, Arlene and Gordon Frann of Salem; a son-in-law, Charles Mattson of Salem, and two brothers in Denmark.

Funeral services will be held from the Clough-Barrick chapel Friday, February 23, at 2 p.m., with Rev. Warren Hale officiating. Interment at the City View cemetery.
