Veteran Mail Carrier Quits

Independence—Ed M. Winder, Independence rural mail carrier for more than 30 years, will retire April 1.

Winder gives many interesting facts about distances traveled, gasoline and oil used, extra work in early years for more income, his substitutes, his route's increase in mileage, mail carried and interesting experiences in serving his patrons.

"On April 1, I will have traveled about 500,000 miles carrying mail over the Independence rural route for 30 years. I month and 15 days; used about 40,000 gallons of gasoline and enough oil to float a battleship. I also used 11 automobiles, three horses and two buggies.

"I have been reminded many times that I had a preferred job at big wages and that I ought to have been able to put away \$100 each month. Only my family and I knew the truth of the financial difficulty. During the first World War I paid \$32 for a 33x3 high pressure tire which was supposed to run 6,000 miles, only to have it blow out at 300 miles."
