Oldest Linn Native Called

Albany—Delavan Shepherd (Vanny) Smith, 87, one of the oldest natives of Linn county, died at his home at 820 W. Fourth street, Sunday night. Funeral services are to be held Friday at 2:30 o'clock from the First Methodist church, with the Rev. Edward Terry officiating. Burial will be made in the Masonic cemetery.

Mr. Smith was the son of Delavan Smith, Oregon's first United States senator, and was born on his parent's homestead, 6 miles southeast of Albany, on February 16, 1858, the year before Oregon was admitted as a state. He served as page of the senate in 1878 and on his 21st birthday, February 16, 1879, was sworn in as deputy sheriff for I. C. Dickey. He served several terms as deputy under a number of sheriffs and also as sheriff for one term. He then moved to his farm where he lived, with his family, for 11 years and in 1906 was elected sheriff of Linn county. He held this office for three consecutive terms and in 1913 retired to his home in Albany where he lived until his death. He had been bailiff of the Linn county circuit for more than 60 years, with only a few years intervening when he did not hold that office. He was bailiff of the court until his death.

He married Carrie M. Clark at Albany, December 14, 1881, who died December 15, 1930. He is survived by six children, who are: Mrs. Ina M. Thomas, Volena Smith, Albany; Delavan C. Smith, Portland; Merrill N. Smith, Albany; also eight grandchildren and seven great grandchildren. Two children died in infancy. He was a member of the Methodist church and as his father, had been a lifelong Democrat.
