Polk Districts Keep Directors

Dallas—Reports for the past year, election of directors for Polk county's seven districts and a short program featured the annual meeting of the Polk county chapter of the American Red Cross in the Dallas Chamber of Commerce.

At the conclusion of the business session and program, Vice Chairman A. V. Oliver presented a 25-year service pin to Dr. A. B. Starbuck, who is retiring from active duty this year after having headed the chapter since its inception 28 years ago. A ten-year emblem was presented to Mrs. C. N. Bilyeu, secretary of the organization for the past 13 years.

Presiding over the business meeting was Dr. A. B. Starbuck, who, after an introductory talk in which he sketched the activities of the chapter since it was founded, introduced executive board members and the chairman of the voluntary services, Mrs. C. L. Crider, who in turn called upon heads of the various divisions under her chairmanship for reports.

Vice Chairman Oliver, head of the Red Cross war fund drive in the county, reported a total of \$24,841.95 received from the county's seven districts during this year's drive. The report of the treasurer, W. A. Barnum, showed total receipts of \$29,026.24, and disbursements of \$22,326.08. Executive Secretary Mrs. A. J. Cleveland, reporting on home services, stated that 265 new cases had come under her jurisdiction this year. Her report on the blood bank showed contributions of 1,640 pints of blood during the year and 15 gallon club members. Staff assistants, Mrs. John Cerny and Mrs. Cecil Dunn, each with 310 hours of service, were commended by Mrs. Cleveland for their help in her office.

Volunteer Services Chairman Mrs. C. L. Crider, after a brief sketch of the various activities of her group, introduced chairman of the special services, Mrs. Helen Van Buren. Reports were given by Mrs. E. B. Hamilton, Junior Red Cross; Mrs. K. B. Krasnow, Girl Scouts; Mrs. A. W. Linn, First Aid; Mrs. C. T. Smith, canteen; Mrs. Charles H. Greenwood, camp and hospital; Mrs. Edna Miller, corps (given by Mrs. Crider); and Mrs. Merrill Hart, home nursing.

Service stripes were presented by the executive secretary to Mrs. Krasnow of the Girl Scouts and to Mrs. C. T. Smith, Dallas, Mrs. Helen Van Buren, Rickreall; Mrs. Clarence Harwood, Independence, and Mrs. Otis Powell, Independence, the county's four canteen chairmen.

Present directors of the seven districts were all re-elected. Two additional directors, Mrs. W. H. Thurston and Mrs. W. A. Barnum, were elected to districts 4, which comprises Independence, Buena Vista and Greenwood. The meeting of the board of directors, at which officers will be named, was set for the evening of June 12.

A play, "The Angel of the Battlefield," featuring the life of Clara Barton, was presented by a cast of 17 from the Junior high school. Other program numbers included selections by the Dallas high school girls' sextette, a reading by A. V. Oliver and a song by Donald Hughes. Mrs. E. B. Hamilton served as program chairman.

Raise in Water Rates Sought

Silvertown — Rohlin Cooley, president, released the results of the Silvertown planning commission meeting this week, telling of the request to be made of the city council at the Monday evening session concerning the raise in water fees.

A ten-cent fire protection tax will be added to the present rates to users in the city limits, and a 15 per cent increase also will be handed out to all users for the time being, and later an additional per cent, named at the time of assessment, will be placed on users' rates outside the city limits. This, the president explained, is to be kept as a sinking fund which should total some \$30,000 in ten years' time and can be used for only repairs to the water system.

The adoption of the proposition of the commission depends entirely on the action of the city council in their vote Monday night.

Minor recommendations to the city council from the commission are that no house under the cost of \$2,500 be built in the space near the city park or in the rear of Coolidge street. Certain areas near the oil tanks on McClaine street are to be listed as industrial rather than resident properties.

Mrs. Lillian Crane, class advisor, basing her remarks upon the class motto, "To the Stars Through Difficulty," spoke briefly to the class "On the Road to the Stars," admonishing "onward and upward" as guiding star in future as in the past.

In presenting diplomas, K. J. Purdy, chairman of the local board of directors, expressed appreciation of the nation's public system and praised cooperation of patrons with the faculty and the board in efforts calculated best to subserve the interests of the schools. "Parents also are entitled to diplomas for the splendid results of the school year in assisting the pupils," Purdy declared.

Dallas Honors Polk War Dead

Dallas—Before a large audience, Polk county war dead were honored in a memorial service on the courthouse lawn Wednesday. Rev. Clark S. Enz selected the phrase, "To you from failing hands we throw the torch," from the poem, "In Flanders Field," as the theme of his memorial day address, "Looking Forward."

Fifteen new white crosses had been placed on the lawn in memory of Polk county boys who lost their lives in World War II, making a total of 107 crosses. The fifteen were Raymond Brown, Dennis Jones, Robert Lloyd Franck, William Schaeffer, Earl Watson, William Weir Blackley, Loren Earl Case, Harold Olfert, Leslie Ray Arrance, Ernest Archie Buckingham, Kendall Helgerson, Merrill Van Cleave, William Holt, Russell Newhouse and Theodore Koefgen.

Program numbers, with Edward J. Himes, American Legion chairman, in charge, included: Overture by the Dallas high school band, under the direction of Miss Earline Gleason; invocation, led by S. E. Whitworth; placing of poppies at the foot of crosses by Boy Scouts; recitation, Albert Zentz; song, audience, led by Miss Gleason and accompanied by the band; Lincoln's Gettysburg Address, Robert Ediger; reading of names of those who died during the past year by Mr. Himes from the roll of honor; recitation, Dorothy Keller.

Following Rev. Enz's address a half minute silence was observed in tribute to the war dead. Concluding the silence was the blowing of taps by W. A. Boydston. Rev. Enz pronounced the benediction and the band concluded the program with the playing of "The Star Spangled Banner."
