Indian Background Given For Retreats of Laymen

Mt. Angel—As the Mount of Angels was the Tap-a-Lam-a-Ho (Mount of Communion) to the Abiqua Indians who looked upon it as the dwelling place of the Great Spirit, so Mount Angel remains for the many laymen who come each year to a place to spend a few days in communion with God in recollection and prayer.

"The Indians may have been very vague about their ideas of the Great Spirit," writes the Rev. Damian Jentes, spiritual director of the Laymen's Retreat Guild, in a booklet commemorating the 25th anniversary of the first laymen's retreat on the hilltop, "but what the Indians started was properly directed and perfected by the white man when in 1882 the

intrepid Father Adelhelm Odernatt led his small band of monks up on the slopes of the same mount.

After many years the laymen of Oregon began to desire a location to set apart to "the exclusive interests of their duties to God. They looked for a place where, under proper direction, they might spend a few days to a fuller study of their religion, to recollect on, and to prayer."

In his booklet, Father Damian shows how Mt. Angel has filled that need.

The laymen's retreat was suggested at the 1918 Knights of Columbus state convention. The following year it was resolved that the K. of C. of Oregon should attend a retreat each year, and Mt. Angel was chosen as the location.

"Retreats were held uninterruptedly each year except in 1927 due to the fact that the disastrous fire of 1926 had put to ashes the entire Benedictine institution."

Father Damian continues, "This year marks the 25th anniversary of the founding of the Mt. Angel Laymen's Retreat Guild. Thus Mt. Angel continues to remain the Mount of Communion not only for the monks of St. Benedict, but also for laymen who come each year to commune with their God."

The retreats this year will be directed by Rev. Alcuin Heibel June 15 to 17, June 22-24 and August 17-19. Laymen throughout the state who desire to attend a retreat this year are asked to make their reservations as soon as possible.
