

Pioneer Lincoln Grove Scene Of Annual Homecoming Picnic

Lincoln—The annual homecoming picnic of Lincoln and Zena was held in Mickey's grove, formerly known as Toner's pasture, with 124 present, ten more than last year. Mr. and Mrs. L. I. Mickey now own the grove on the Willamette river.

Col. Carle Abrams, son of pioneer parents, Mr. and Mrs. Louis Abrams, who was elected president last year, was re-elected at the business meeting. L. I. Mickey was elected as vice president, and Hazel Dell Price was re-elected as secretary-treasurer. Col. Abrams kept the same standing committees, including: Program, Mrs. Lois Crawford, Mrs. Greta Hatt and Mrs. W. B. Hunt; dinner, Mrs. L. I. Mickey, Roy E. Barker and Frank Boehringer. Historian is Mrs. W. D. Henry, and publicity, Mrs. Lois Crawford.

The oldest person attending the affair was Mrs. Sarah Whitney, 95, mother of Mrs. Lake Price and Pleasant Whitney, who gave a reading. The youngest one was Danny Carlson, one and a half years old. Coming from as far away as Brownsville, Eugene, Portland, Dallas and Dayton were some of the old time residents.

L. I. Mickey was instructed to build more tables for the 1946 picnic, which will be held in the grove as usual. Roy E. Barker reported the recent death of a relative, Rev. Thomas Robinson, who attended last year and took part in the program.

Three octogenarians were present, Albert M. Patrick, born in 1861, Mrs. Carrie Penrose and Mrs. Cora Walling, born in 1862. Mrs. Penrose claims the greatest number of descendants, having 24 grandchildren and 26 great grandchildren. Mrs. John Childers, 70, was the old person present in point of years of residence, having been born in Lincoln in 1875.

Woodburn—A budget hearing will be held at the next meeting of the city council, June 19 at 7:30 p.m. in the city hall. The council, acting as a levying board for the city of Woodburn, will hear all persons subject to the proposed tax in favor of or against said proposed tax levy or levies of any part thereof.

Linn Taxable Values Soar

Albany—Valuations of taxable property in Linn county have risen to an all-time high record, County Assessor W. C. Templeton reported this week-end.

The assessor's records, as finally equalized by the county board of equalization, show the county's valuation now to be \$29,386,500, not including utilities. Addition of utility valuations will probably bring the total to approximately \$34,000,000, which he compared with the \$31,067,923 figure attained in 1920, which was the highest point heretofore reached by Linn valuations.

The assessor's 1945-46 appraisals give an increase of \$3,023,180 in valuations for the coming tax year over the total for the 1944-45 year, after deduction of \$65,090 for veterans' and widows' exemptions. Present valuations of real property total \$23,750,470, an increase of \$2,208,210, while personal property is assessed at \$5,636,030, an increase of \$815,160.
