

Infantry Show Due Silverton

Silverton — "Here's Your Infantry" will be in Silverton this week, the only appearance of the large group of actors in Marion county. Around eighty performers will stage a real battle story for the local and visiting public, with room for all observers on McGinnis field early Friday evening. The personnel of the servicemen in the act will be housed at the armory Thursday and Friday nights.

This affair is free to the public as a seventh war loan culmination. Jim Clough is local chairman, assisted by a committee. The U. S. treasury department is making the show possible.

"Here's Your Infantry" presents three phases of educational entertainment in preparation for battle, assault on a pill box and exhibit of infantry weapons and equipment.

General instructions announce that "the army has agreed that bond admissions may be used in connection with 'Here's Your Infantry'." This, however, is not a recommendation that war bond admissions be used. The decision is entirely in the hands of the state war finance committee. It is announced locally that the bond admission is not a requirement but admission is entirely free.

Linn Bullfight Ends in Death Berlin Bovine

Albany — Albert Swink, a farmer and dairyman in the Berlin neighborhood, is reported to have experienced a thrilling bull fight.

Many Registered For Summer Term

Oregon College of Education — Registration figures reached a total of 467 at the Oregon College of Education for the first summer school term. This number includes a group of 240 experienced teachers who are taking the short session course of two weeks, organized on a work-shop basis for the various types of teaching on the elementary level. Registrar Ellis A. Stebbins stated that this is the largest enrollment since the summer of 1938 when a similar two-weeks' course was offered.

The regular six-weeks session will continue until July 18 with registration closing on Monday, June 18. A total of 227 in this group shows an increase of 14 percent over the enrollment for the same term last year.
