

Scio Lacking Teaching Staff

Scio — Melvin Sweet, Scio business man, was elected this week as a member of the board of directors of school district 95. He had been serving by appointment for several weeks, succeeding W. H. Dennison, who moved to Lebanon.

Budget prepared for the 1945-46 school year was adopted, showing total estimated expense of \$21,100; amount of indebtedness, bonded, \$7,500; estimated receipts and cash balance, \$8,451.70.

In addition to board members and district clerk, seven persons attended the meeting, which was conducted by K. J. Purdy, chairman of the board. Other members are Waldo De-Moy and Melvin Sweet, Chairman Purdy presided with Mrs. Eunice Bartu as clerk.

Mrs. LaRowe informed the board by letter that she did not plan to return to the Scio system for next year. Complete teaching staff had not been secured, board members stated.

Total insurance on school buildings and equipment was stated as \$33,000. The meeting authorized payment of the Scio mill company's claim of \$234 for tennis court cement. A few minor bills also were ordered paid.

Gates—William A. Chittick, who with his three daughters and son were held prisoners of the Japs for three years at Santa Tomas and who returned recently to the States, is a guest at the home of his sister, Mrs. Clarence Rush.

Chittick and family were residents of Manila at the time of the invasion, where he held the position of vice president of the Western Electric Equipment company. Chittick had been employed in that city for 25 years. He was hospitalized in San Francisco upon his return to the United States for three weeks. His weight when interned was 170 pounds, at the time of his release he weighed 100 pounds.

His mother, with whom he is also spending much of his time, resides at 2234 Lee street, Salem.

Chittick will leave soon for Chicago and New York where he will remain for several months before his return to the Philippines. His daughter and son are visiting relations in Yakima, Wash.

Lyons elected Albert Carr as director for three years and Chester Grimes, director for two years, and will hold a meeting Friday night to appoint the clerk.

Dallas Council Adopts Budget

Dallas—The budget for the city of Dallas for the year 1945-46, as prepared by the budget subcommittee, calling for a levy of \$23,984.97, was adopted by the city budget committee at a meeting following the regular council meeting Monday night. The levy represents a \$2,000 increase over last year's figure of \$21,987.72, but estimated expenditures for the ensuing year, placed at \$41,484.97, show a drop of approximately \$4,000 over last year's \$45,587.72. The levy boost was necessary to take care of the falling off of receipts from other than tax sources.

Public hearing date was set for Monday night, July 16, in the council chamber. Earle Richardson headed the budget committee, with subcommittee members preparing the budget including C. B. Sundberg, Leif S. Finseth and Carl Gerlinger, Jr.

At the council meeting, C. B. Sundberg, reporting on behalf of the special sewage disposal plant committee, stated that a sample ordinance loaned by the League of Oregon Cities, relative to the setting up of a charge scale, had been placed with the city attorney as a guide in preparing an ordinance to present to councilmen for their consideration.

In a discussion on post-war aviation and airport development, C. L. Marsters reported on a recent meeting relative to the matter which he had attended in Salem, and stated that a meeting of CAA representatives was pending here.

Sundberg reported one block on Howe street and two on Holman street were in the process of being graded with rock taken from the city park pool.

Turner Bond Drive Quota Oversubscribed

Turner—The bond quota of \$22,000 has been reached and oversubscribed to an amount of \$22,875 and more is still expected to come in. The bond sales have reached \$13,350, which is more than the quota.
