Dallas—Lenora Rico Zizumbo and Anastacio Zizumbo, Mexicans accused of striking a n d causing death of a fellow Mexican national, Louis Serna Fabian in a row at the Horst Brothers hop yard in Independence, June 3, pleaded guilty to a charge of manslaughter before Circuit Judge Arlie G.
