

St. Paul Gets Top Cowboys

St. Paul—Top western cowboys will compete for a total of \$7500 in prize money along with a \$500 war bond at the tenth annual St. Paul rodeo slated for July 1 to 4. President Ray Manegre of the rodeo association explained that this prize money is second only to that posted for the Pendleton Round-Up in the northwest.

First cowboys signifying their intentions of competing in this year's St. Paul show are Dave Campbell, Searchlight, Nev., and Barney Willis, White Salmon, Wash.

Bronc riding, Brahma bull riding, bulldogging, calf roping, and wild horse racing carry \$1000 purses. A \$500 purse is listed for wild cow milking; chariot race and pony express each carry \$200 purses, and the St. Paul derby lists \$150. On top of these awards is the \$500 war bond to be given by the Mission Bottom community riders to the rodeo's best all-around cowboy.

Rodeo association members announce the purchase of a 5-acre tract adjoining the grandstand which will be used for free auto parking during the four-day show. Construction of three new stands brings rodeo park's seating capacity to 8500, which includes 700 reserved seats along with 60 boxes. As a special convenience to competing cowboys, box stalls are now being constructed under the grandstand for their roping and dogging horses.

Chairman Robin Day, Salem, of the queen's selection committee, announces that all members of the rodeo court will be presented with war bonds. Rose Mae Franke, Salem, is queen.
