

Silverton Planning Unit Discusses Bugs, Insects

Silverton—Bugs and insects had their inning for methods of extermination at the meeting of the Silverton planning commission. Rholin Cooley, president, told of the advice of Dr. C. W. Keene on the procuring of earwig parasite flies to release for ridding the town of the earwigs, which for the first time in more than eight years are making much of a destructive nuisance of themselves. At that time, also on the recommendation of Dr. Keene, several colonies of the earwig exterminator flies were turned loose in various parts of town, and away went the earwig.

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as to the cost and possibilities of obtaining the flies. The commission will recommend to the city council that action against the earwig be taken.

Though the town proper has not noticed the presence of mosquitoes this season, a member of the commission, Lillie Madsen, reported the presence of the pest at the Madsen home in the Brush Creek district, stating that presumably the north breezes assisted their locomotion from the Evans Brothers and Minden Mill ponds, which started a discussion on the possible extermination of mosquitoes by planting fish in the ponds which like the larvae as special diet, or of encouraging the culture of breeding ducks on the ponds with the ducks relishing the mosquito as bait.

Dr. P. A. Loar, commission member, advised against the mosquito spray for general use as it was death to bees as well as to pest insects.

Lloyd Larsen, member, appeared before the Silverton Grange and asked for cooperation in making possible fire protection for rural sections within a radius of six miles from the city limits.

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West Salem Will Receive Mobile Unit Advantages

West Salem, June 27—Free chest X-rays will be available to people of West Salem and the surrounding communities on Monday, July 2, through the sponsorship of the Lions club and the Kingwood American Legion and auxiliary. This free, voluntary and confidential offer is made possible by the County Public Health association with the use of the Oregon Tuberculosis association's chest X-ray survey unit.

The Mobile X-ray unit will be at the West Salem City Hall on the above date from the hours of 10 a.m. to 12 noon and from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. A minimum of 300 applications for X-rays is necessary to secure a visit by the unit and to date but 162 of this quota have been received.

Those who wish to take advantage of this X-ray service are urged to secure applications from Mr. Pattison at the City Hall or from Earl Burke at Burk's Auto Court, at the earliest possible time so that they may receive a specific appointment.

The various industrial plants such as the canneries, box factory, etc., have been assigned definite periods during the day for their employees but persons without appointments will be worked in as rapidly as possible. Housewives or unemployed persons are especially requested to report for X-rays during the morning as there seems to be fewer requests for early appointments.

The project is receiving the endorsement of the various local organizations, who are urging their membership to avail themselves of this opportunity to safeguard the health of their families. Children will be X-rayed whenever time is warranted although emphasis is being placed upon the advisability of adult X-rays as a source of detecting any chest disease within a family.

Having a chest X-ray is safe and harmless. It takes only a half minute to take the picture and after you are X-rayed a card or letter is sent to you at your home informing you of the result of the findings. Only the person X-rayed is given this information.

Dressing rooms for both men and women will be arranged in the City Hall to supplement the private dressing compartments which are a part of the survey unit. Capes are provided for women having pictures taken.

Silverton—Alf. O. Nelson, local attorney, and the latest member to be elected to the planning commission body, an experimental and advisory group to the city council, presented a seven-point program to the commission shortly after his election.

At Monday night's meeting of the commission, Dr. Loar, a member, suggested that the program get into practical action as soon as possible. This met with the approval of the commission and at the next meeting, the fourth Monday in July, each commission member will be allotted special responsibility in the planned program.

Nelson suggested that two more points should be included now, as recent industrial changes in the town demanded it. These were the bringing to town of some major industry, several smaller industrial plants, a definite within-the-city limits, road and street programs and the better upkeep of sidewalks.

The original points suggested by Nelson include sports, state and federal aid and taxes, parks and highways, transportation traffic and communications, irrigation and rural electrification, electric power and water, and good citizenship.

Nelson explained that in his opinion it was the duty of every citizen to make Silverton a town where the right kind of people would want to come to make their homes.
