

Polk County Budget Shows Increase Over Last Year

Dallas—The Polk county budget for the fiscal year 1945-46 calling for a levy of \$238,829.60 (inside 6 per cent limitation), as proposed by the budget committee, was accepted at the public hearing of taxpayers in the county courthouse. The levy shows an increase of \$13,473.30 over last year's \$225,356.30 figure. Estimated expenditures for total of all funds is \$352,679.60 as against last year's \$357,181.50. Estimated receipts, \$113,850, from other than the

tax source, show a drop of \$33,200 over the previous year's \$147,050.

A motion to reduce by \$5,000 the total of an item allotted to the health department passed, but was later reconsidered and restored after Dr. Ripley of the health department explained the action would result in the cutting off of \$2,000 from state support. A motion to eliminate an item of \$1,500 in the budget for a home demonstration agent in the county failed to carry.

R. M. Walker called attention of the taxpayers to the serious drop in assessed valuation in the county resulting from loss of the Camp Adair area, and suggested the need of a committee to study budget revision.

Serving as secretary at the meeting was Earle Richardson. Members of the budget committee included county court members, Judge Herman Van Well and Commissioners Fred Gibson and Harrison Brandt, George A. Woods, chairman of the budget committee, J. G. Hogg and R. M. Walker, committee members.

Fruit Pickers Are in Demand

Dallas — Berry and cherry pickers in Polk county are urged to call at the farm labor office in their vicinity and sign up for jobs harvesting these two crops.

Cherry picking will start in a few places in the county as early as Friday and the balance of the cherries and berries will be ready soon after the first of July, according to Ray Kliever, farm labor assistant.

Some of the growers are furnishing transportation. Those people wishing to drive their own vehicles will be furnished gasoline to do so by calling at the farm labor office. When workers register at the farm labor office and are referred to farm jobs, the county farm labor assistant will fill out a recommendation for additional gasoline if it is necessary. This recommendation will be submitted to the local war price and rationing board, together with application for this special gasoline ration.

The Dallas farm labor office is located on the second floor of the city hall and the Independence farm labor office at 148 C street. The offices are open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Registrations will be taken by telephone. Call 94 at Dallas and 178 at Independence.

St. Paul Rodeo Purses Heavy

St. Paul, June 28—Willamette valley cowboys and cowgirls are awaiting their chance to compete for \$7,500 in prizes which are being offered by this year's St. Paul rodeo, July 1 to 4. A \$500 war bond is also being given to the outstanding cowboy of the four performances.

Construction crews are putting the finishing touches on the new covered grandstand and bucking chutes, and the town has taken on a pioneer day atmosphere with flag bedecked streets and a noticeable replacement of cars by spirited western horses.

Harley Tucker, Joseph stockman is expected to arrive this week with 65 head of bucking horses, Gramma bulls, dogging steers and black Angus cows and calves. Some 50 wild horses, fresh from the Warm Springs Indian reservation ranges, are scheduled to be transferred before Saturday from a Mission Bottom farm to rodeo park corals.

Queen Rose Mae Franke, Salem, and her court of princesses, Carol Chambers, McMinnville; Donna McKay and Mary Lou Manegre, St. Paul; and Dorothy Rolston, Tillamook, will lead the wild west parade on St. Paul's streets at 10 a.m., July 4. 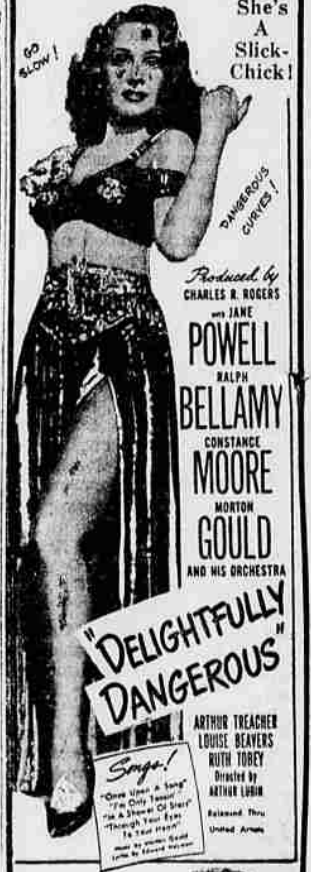
