He seeks \$2500 building cost and \$2500 additional loss to business. William Lord of Portland is attorney for the plaintiff.

Airport Sites Are Considered

Lebanon—Three possible sites, one to be chosen for Lebanon's post-war airport are being considered by the civil aeronautics authority, following a survey conducted in the Lebanon vicinity by Engineer Harper of the Seattle office. Exact locations of the sites was not disclosed at this time, except that the present Lebanon airport, with a proposed purchase of additional land, is one of them, according to E. N. Brenner, commander of CAP activities in Lebanon. The other sites are west of town.

The engineer, who took soil and wind tests on all three locations, stated that he would have nothing definite to report for at least six weeks.

According to information, there is no construction contemplated until after the war, but surveys are being made at this time in order to have the necessary data.

The Lebanon port, owned and operated by Ralph Scroggin and Joe Gilbert only last week was designated for use as a training area port, and CAP flying, as well as private flying and flight training may be carried on as soon as the field is ready, about July 1. The port had been closed since immediately after our entry into the war.

Horse Tossed Man Dies of Injuries

Lebanon—Henry Baker, about 55, employee of the C. C. Cameron Lumber company, Albion, died in the Lebanon General hospital Thursday afternoon after being thrown from a horse near the Mountain Home school Wednesday.

Baker, with Clyde Chandler, another employee of Cameron Lumber, was said to have been living in Chandler's house trailer while they were working on logging operations in that vicinity. So far no information as to relatives of the man had been obtained here.

Details of the accident were slight, but Baker was said to have been taken into a house near the scene of the fall, and was brought from there by the Lebanon ambulance. He had been in an unconscious state since the accident.

He suffered a fractured skull and also had a serious leg injury.
