

Humphrey Clan Holds Reunion

Humphrey, who, with his family of sons and daughters, some of whom were then married, crossed the plains in 1853, settling in Linn county. This family came from Tennessee.

Ashby, program committee chairman, assisted by Maud Harms and Alma Knowler, entertained the group with the following program: Maud Harms, a "stunt" punch board; Alma Knowler gave three poems; Sam J. Harms read a poem written by Sgt. Fay E. Humphrey while on bivouac in France in October 1944. As far as is known, Sgt. Humphrey is the only member of the clan to have given his life in the service in this war. Jennie Humphrey, the historian, read a history of the family.

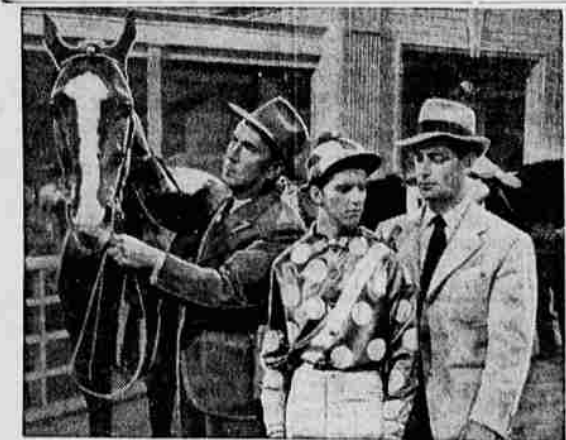
County Agent Gross Gives Picture Show

Rationing Boards Change Schedules

Woodburn—A revised schedule of hours when the local ration board will be open has been announced. Beginning Monday, the boards will be open from 10 a. m. to 3 p. m. Monday through Friday and from 10 a. m. to 12 noon on Saturday. The office is open one evening each week, Tuesday, from 6 to 9 o'clock.

This schedule, under which the board first operated, is made necessary by the large volume of rationing applications received and will give additional time during which the board personnel may work without interruptions assuring better service to the public through the more expeditious issuance of rations.

Silverton—The Silverton rationing board hours for the public have been changed to 10 a. m. to 3 p. m., Mondays through Fridays and from 10 a. m. to 12 noon, Saturdays. Evening hours will remain the same as previous schedule.

Independence—Mrs. Ralph Evans, chief clerk at the local ration board office, announces that the new office hours are as follows: 10:00 a. m. to 3:00 p. m., Mondays through Friday; Thursdays 10:00 a. m. to 9:00 p. m. and Saturdays 10:00 a. m. to 12 noon.

Linn Enrollment Continues Climb

Albany—Figures to be contained in the annual report of County School Superintendent J. M. Bennet, unfolded to the taxpayers of Linn county a picture of what is to be expected in demands for school plant enlargement throughout the county within the next few years.

The superintendent revealed that during the last year total enrollment in grade and high schools of the county has jumped from 7772 pupils for the 1943-44 year to 8429 for the current year, an increase of 657, while grade school enrollments have increased from 5779, last year's total, to 6454, a gain of 675.

Biggest increase of any one group is shown in the first grade which leaped upward by 212 during the last year.
