Albany — More than 100 workers, mostly women and young persons, were sent into the fields of Linn county Monday through the agency of the local farm labor office in response to farmers' pleas as warm weather hastened ripening of small fruits.

Largest single group was dispatched to the Hanford raspberry yard near Lebanon, where 60 pickers procured by the local office through the efforts of W. V. Merrill and Jay Palmer, farm labor assistants, were at work Monday.

Small fruit picking, however, still faces its peak.

While more farm workers could be used, it was stated, fears of a shortage of haying hands have been no little allayed by the recruitment of plywood workers and loggers, who are otherwise temporarily idle because of a Fourth of July layoff.
