

One-handed Cowboy Tops Heavy Field at Rodeo

St. Paul, Ore., July 5—A record crowd of some 12,000 Willamette valley residents viewed the closing show of the four day St. Paul rodeo Wednesday. Mitch Owens, one-handed Fresno, Calif., cowboy, won top honors at this the 10th annual St. Paul rodeo, outpointing 60 contestants for honors as the best all around cowboy.

He received a \$500 war bond after finals for championships. He was the only rider to stay four successive rides on Brahma bulls and was thrown once in four bronc rides.

Champions were: calf roping, Amye Gambelin, Wilson, Okla.; Brahma bull, Owens; bronc, Chuck Sheppard, Kirkland.

Polk Needing Farm Workers

Dallas—Hundreds of emergency farm workers are needed at once to save the highly perishable berry and cherry crop in Polk county, farm labor Assistant Ray Kliever said today.

"We are calling on all local citizens who can spare even a few hours a day to help farmers harvest these valuable food crops, so important in meeting the increased demands of war," he added.

Kliever asked that anyone willing to help out on the farm call at the farm labor office in Dallas or Independence. Arrangements have been made to transport workers to farms where labor is needed, and to bring them back into town each evening.

Already a number of high school students, housewives and business people are serving as emergency harvest workers. However, even more are needed if all of the berry and cherry crop is to be saved.

Kliever emphasized that all workers are paid the prevailing wage, which is 3½c to 5c per pound for picking cherries, depending on size of crop.

Linn Grand Jurors Get Assault Case

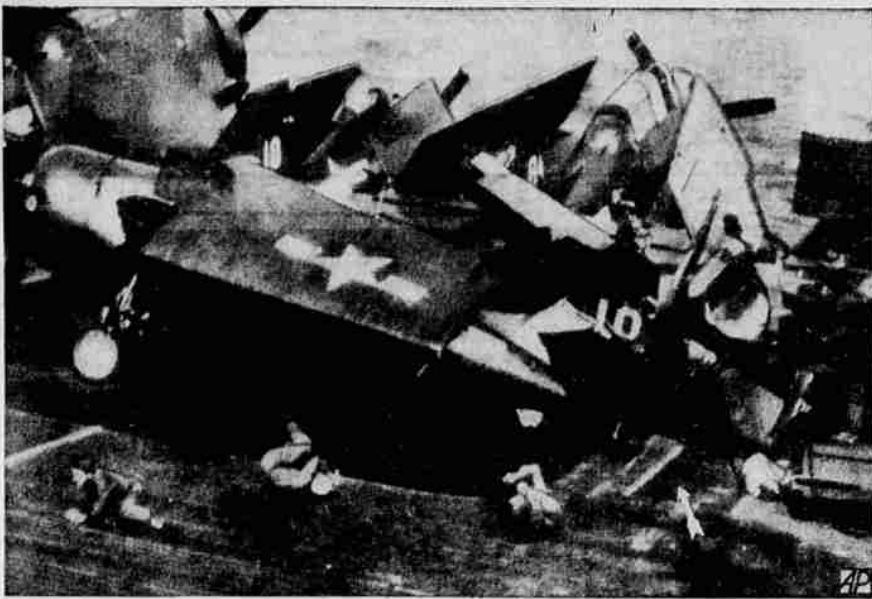

Hundreds Sought For Berry Harvest

Routine Affairs Before Council

Silverton—The pre-Fourth of July council meeting held strictly to resolutions, ordinances and discussions with the mid-year reports read and acted upon.

Resolution No. 373 authorized the sale to M. Von Somaner of lots 5 and 6, block 2, Davenport addition for the sum of \$300. Resolution No. 374 granted the request of Mrs. Ethel Bock that she be permitted to pay the principal, the sum of \$29, to the city on a property assessment that she had been unaware of its not having been paid a number of years ago, and that she had received no notice of the lien against the property which was recently sold to Lloyd Larson.

Amending ordinance No. 340, ordinance No. 352 was passed on its first and second readings. This was done at the request of the city planning commission in respect to changing a portion of the residence zone to an industrial section. The property is near the city cemetery. The ordinance also asked that no buildings under the construction price of \$2500 be built in Park Side addition.

Two claims for damages done to properties along the Abiqua water line were allowed. Beverly Town will be paid \$50 and Lewis Robert, \$35 to completely satisfy claims for damage.

Councilmen present were Cliff Dickerson, Reber Allen, Alfred Adams, Jonas Byberg and Tom Anderson. Dr. R. J. VanCleave, absent. Mayor George Christensen presided and City Manager Robert E. Borland served as secretary.

Alderman Dickerson explained the need of some street-cleaning curtailment in respect to rackets in which the phone sellers represented themselves as authority on intermediaries between parents and their men and women in service. Dickerson cited the case of arrests made of these vendors in both Albany and Lebanon and asked the council to consider some move to hinder operations of false representatives. The material having been sold here had included a Purple Heart insignia, service flags, buttons and unauthorized flowers as well as other mementoes.

Discrimination of assessment of fines for the same offenses were also frowned upon and brought to the surface by Alderman Dickerson.
