Swim Campaign Opens Monday

Under the sponsorship of the American Red Cross the annual "Learn to Swim" campaign will be conducted at the Olinger and Leslie playground fields, July 8-20, inclusive. Immediate registration is being urged in order that no delay will be encountered in getting classes formed on the first day of the campaign. Those registering will be formed into appropriate groups and adequate supervision and instruction is available for all classes.

At Leslie pool, the program will be under the general supervision of Bob Keuscher who is to be assisted by Jean Barham and Suzanne Small. Tom Drynan will direct the campaign at Olinger, assisted by Janet Rogers, Bob Thompson and Allan Bellinger.

Identical schedules will be in effect at both pools: Intermediates from 10 to 10:30 a.m., adult beginners, 10:30 to 11 a.m.; boy beginners, 11 to 11:30 a.m.; girl beginners, 11:30-12 noon; swimmers, 12 to 12:30 p.m.

Washington, July 6 (AP)—Auto industry tradition which keeps each manufacturer's cost figures his own top secret is posing a first class headache for OPA in fixing new passenger car price ceilings.

The problem, it was learned today, is this:

The industry, perhaps the most highly competitive in American business, is holding out against any round-robin conference where cost information would be openly discussed to determine how much of an industry-wide price increase over 1942 levels should be allowed.

"That's the most closely guarded information in the industry, and no manufacturer is willing to share his with a competitor," and industry spokesmen said.

Auto Prices OPA Headache

This is the case even though the production wheels are turning again and at least one company (Ford) already is rolling a few cars off its assembly lines.

Opposed to a general conference, some companies have met informally with OPA to present a case for separate sessions.

Some have presented cost figures but have asked the agency that they be held in confidence.

They are willing that OPA analyze the collective data of the manufacturing firms, but they don't want it pooled for a competitor to see.

Due to a vacancy in the office of first vice president because of the resignation of E. Burr Miller, three men were advanced. Ed Majek was named first vice president, F. G. Leserer, second, and Floyd Bowers, third.

Define Duties Of Registrar

The Multnomah county election registrar, whose office was created by the 1945 legislature, does not assume the election duties of the Multnomah county commissioner or of the precinct election officials, Attorney General George Neuner ruled today for District Attorney T. B. Handley of Multnomah county.

Neuner pointed out that the 1945 law provides that the registrar shall take over the election duties of the county clerk, supervisor of elections and the sheriff, but that the law failed to mention the commissioners, who also perform some election duties.

The registrar is not under civil service, Neuner held, since no such provision was made in the 1945 law, and since it was enacted after a law providing that appointment of officials in Multnomah county must be made from the civil service registrar.

The registrar bill was the subject of a bitter democratic attack in the legislature, and the Multnomah county democratic organization failed by only a few signatures to have it referred to the people.

Washington, July 6 (AP)—President Truman today signed legislation giving postal employees their first general pay raise since 1925.

For regular postal employees in so-called automatic grades, the legislation provides a 20 percent increase in base pay, or \$400 a year, whichever is the lesser. In no event will the raise be less than \$300.

It provides for overtime payment at the rate of time and one-half for time worked in excess of a basic 260-workdays annually, the payment to be in money or compensating time off, and for a differential of ten percent for employees who work regularly at night. The overtime provisions do not apply to supervisors, rural carriers, traveling mechanics and employees of the railway mail service and the air mail service.

Hopkins Gets Apparel Job

New York, July 6 (AP)—Harry L. Hopkins, for 12 years a key government figure and presidential adviser, today stepped into a new diplomatic role—as impartial chairman of the New York Women's Coat-and-Suit Industry.

His appointment to the post was announced by David Dubinsky, president of the International Ladies Garment Workers' Industry, who said Hopkins would assume his new duties after a few weeks' rest.

As impartial chairman, Hopkins will preside over labor-management contracts, arbitrate disputes, settle industrial problems and generally promote harmony in the gigantic \$500,000,000-a-year industry.

Hopkins, a close personal friend of the late President Roosevelt, resigned his \$15,000 a year advisor's post to President Truman last Tuesday on grounds of ill health.

Union officials reported his new salary would be "in the neighborhood" of \$25,000 annually.

He will succeed former Mayor James J. Walker as impartial chairman. The industry has 50,000 employees, 1300 employers and claims 80 percent of the national coat and suit output.

Fire Damages 2 Residences

Firemen were called this morning at 8:00 to the McDerby residence at 20th and Trade streets, where the large two-story house was in flames. Pay Raise for Postal Clerks

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Ask Return of Lend-lease Guns

Washington, July 6 (AP)—The senate war investigating committee today demanded prompt recovery of lend-lease arms from European allies for use in the Pacific war.

A report based on an overseas investigation by a subcommittee headed by Senator Kilgore (D., W. Va.), said "nothing has been done" along this line nor toward concentrating captured German arms against the Japanese.

"The committee believes that all sources of supply for the Pacific war should be exploited to the maximum," the report stated, "and that existing stocks of armaments and supplies should be drawn upon first where possible, and certainly they should include captured enemy material."

Noting that legal title to lend-lease materials rests with the United States and that master lend-lease agreements specifically provide for their return, the committee said failure to act constitutes "a lack of vigor and attention to our interests."

The report viewed the situation as one of "extreme urgency and serious implications," saying it is boosting war costs and delaying reconversion by causing "manufacture of items identical with those now idle in the hands of our allies."
