Albany Counts Fire Damage

Albany—Fire that virtually destroyed the building at Second and Lyon streets Tuesday night, housing five local business establishments, that caused a loss estimated at more than \$20,000, is believed to have originated with the refrigeration equipment in the rear of the R.
