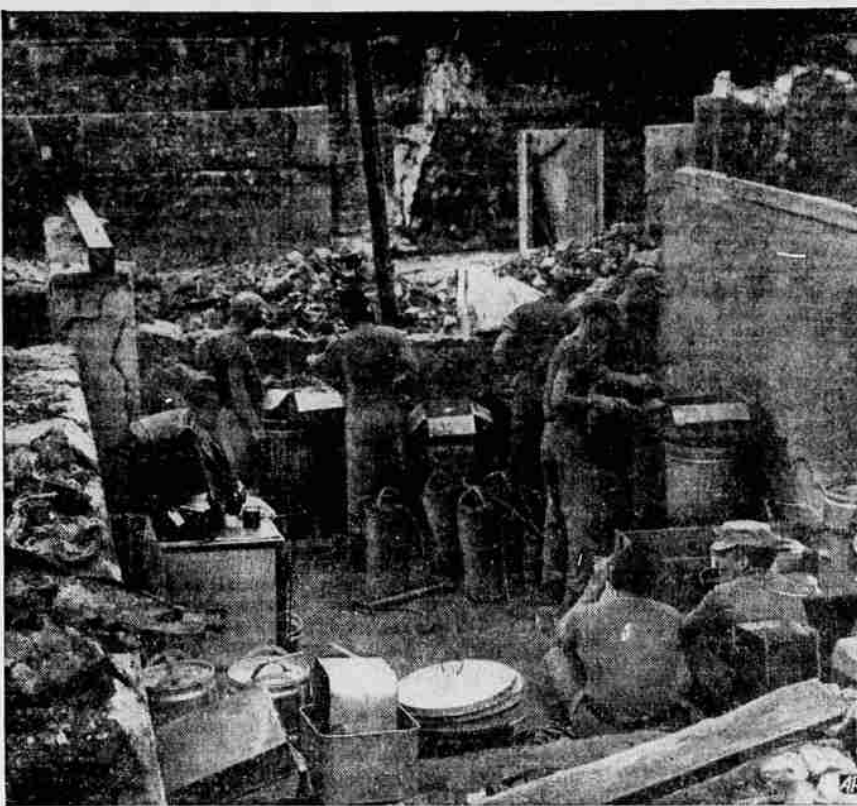

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No Comment On De Gaulle

Washington, July 7 (AP)—A French announcement that Gen. Charles De Gaulle has accepted an invitation to visit President Truman here was met with silence in official Washington today. Neither the White House nor the state department would comment on the announcement that came out of France yesterday—an unusual reception to an exchange of greetings between two government heads.

The French, through an official announcement, said the general has received an invitation to visit President Truman in August, and has accepted.

The announcement produced only a crisp and puzzling "no comment" from the White House which normally might be expected to confirm promptly such an invitation and acceptance.

Later in the day, Henri Bonnet, the French ambassador, visited Mr. Truman and afterwards told reporters the De Gaulle visit has been arranged in every respect except a date. He said he had not discussed the trip with the president because it had been settled previously, and he guessed the general would come here in August. He said an official invitation had been tendered.

Again the White House and the state department remained silent. There were off-the-record indications to reporters that the French announcement was unexpected, to say the least.

Housing Shy For Soldiers

With the first cadre officers and men to be stationed at the Camp Adair redeployment center arriving here in the next few days, Lt. D. O. Hooke, army housing officer, has arranged for rental services to be set up at the USO as well as the city Chamber of Commerce.

Information regarding living space may be phoned into the USO between 2:00 and 4:00 in the afternoon and after 6:00 p.m. and the Chamber of Commerce is taking calls all day. These concerns will be the connecting agents between army men and families and the property owners.

A block survey of the city under the direction of Hazel Harper of the Marion county defense council has been underway for a week but returns by no means meet the required army quota.

Issuing a special appeal to Salem residents, Lt. Hooke urged citizens to "recognize the extreme necessity for homes" and said that the apparent shortage of empty houses warranted acceptance of apartments or single rooms, either furnished or unfurnished. Most of the army men seeking accommodations are overseas veterans who have been separated from their families, he said, and a great number of them have expressed a desire to live here permanently. He guaranteed many long-term rentals.

36 More Trucks For Wheat Farmers

Washington, July 7 (AP)—Senator Cordon (R., Ore.) said today that Oregon wheat farmers have been promised an additional 36 trucks by the surplus property board.

Sales will be made when certificates from local AAA offices are presented to dealers.

Representative Stockman (R., Ore.) announced that Oregon will receive a share of the 176 trucks recently released for four northwestern states.

Mt. Hood Forest Shuts Fire Area

The Dalles, July 7 (AP)—Closure of fire areas in the Mt. Hood national forest will begin July 9, District Ranger Ross Williams said today.

Although the Skyline road will be open to motorists after repairs next week, picnicking will be prohibited, Williams reported. Regions to stay open include the district south from Friend to White River and the Skyline link with Mt. Hood loop road.

headquarters missions to France. The Netherlands and Norway will revert to British war office control. British army elements of supreme headquarters missions to Belgium and Denmark will pass to command of the twenty-first army group.

"Command of all Royal Air Force elements of supreme headquarters missions will be assumed by the air ministry.

"Command of allied land forces in Norway will pass to the war office with the British chief of staff acting as agents to the combined chiefs of staff.

"The Norwegian naval and air forces will continue under present control until, at some later date to be announced, they will revert to control of the Norwegian government.

"Command of British elements of the allied naval command expeditionary force, British naval forces in Norway and British naval elements of all supreme headquarters missions will be assumed by the admiralty.
