Well Cleaning Nearly Ended

Scio—Dredging and cleaning well No. 1 at Scio have been virtually completed this week, and indications at this time are reported reassuring as to adequate supply of wholesome water for domestic use and for moderate lawn irrigation.

Erosion and cave-ins near the bottom of the well had noticeably decreased water flow during recent weeks, hence the council's prompt action to remedy the situation. The city's second deep well also will be cleaned at once, it was stated Wednesday by a council member, with a view of guarantee of ample water supply.

The first well has a depth of 205 feet, while the later drilling exceeded this by two feet. The first well was dredged and emptied of surplus soil and sand six years ago and functioned well until recently.

The second well and other water system improvements were provided by a bond issue of approximately \$15,000 following a special election in 1938. Approximately 50 feet of earth and gravel had accumulated at the bottom of No. 1, it was stated.
