"Deader than a door nail!" Then she pointed to his life-size portrait. "Dat's him up there!"

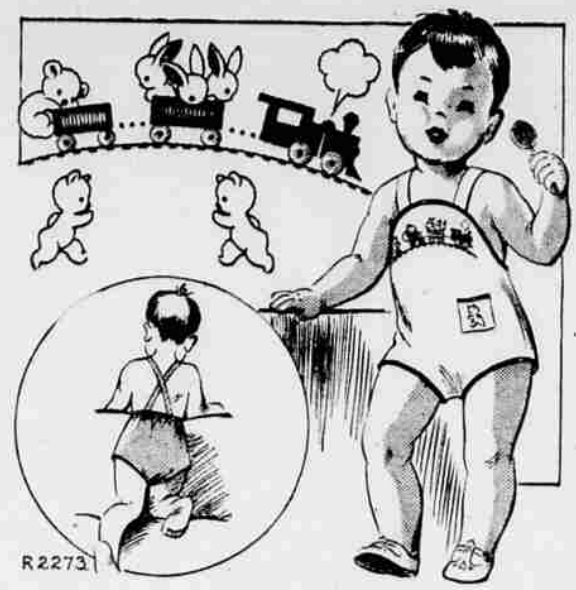
"So—that's Uncle Louie." Thoughtfully the doctor studied the painting; despite the seriousness of the situation he couldn't help but smile.

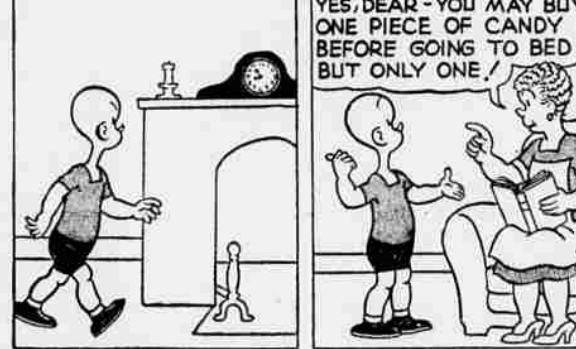
