Marion county had a total of 66 deaths during May, the last month for which official figures are available, with heart disease continuing to be the leading cause. Eighteen deaths were charged against heart trouble, 12 against nephritis, three

diabetes, four as the result of automobile accidents and two from communicable disease. Of the 1075 deaths throughout the state, 291 were from heart disease and 31 from motor vehicle accidents. Cancer claimed 124 victims during the month. The communicable disease report for the week ending July 7 shows two cases of spotted fever, both in Grant county.

To Discontinue V-12 Program

Confirmation of a previous order, discontinuing the V-12 program at Willamette university, has been received by President G. Herbert Smith from the navy department. The communication states that all men on the campus under navy orders will be transferred at the end of the present semester which ends in late October. Approximately 125 men and officers are involved in the order. The men are expected to be transferred to those schools which have naval officers reserve training corps programs, including the ones which were added to the list last spring. Oregon State's NROTC program will open early in November. University of Washington, which has had a navy program, similar to the one at Willamette, will continue work with the NROTC.

The training of future navy officers began at Willamette university in July 1943 and since its establishment several hundred men, including many from the fleet have been stationed here. What disposition will be made of the commissioned and non-commissioned officers has not been decided.

Since the inauguration of the V-12 program at Willamette, the university has operated on a year-round basis, but will return to a normal status in 1946.

Circuit Court
Application for place on the trial docket has been filed in the case of Virginia vs. Clarence Frank Anderson.

Motion to strike has been filed in the case of Lewis E. Beard and also a counter affidavit by plaintiff in which he alleges claims for court costs and expenses are exorbitant.

Assignment of judgment from Salem Collectors in Credit Bureau has been filed in the case of Salem Collectors vs. J. C. Marley. Judgment is listed at \$1401.04 and costs.

Demurrer and motions have been filed in the case of Vesta O. vs. Paul L. Wolf.

In answer to the complaint of Dever Band vs. A. M. Church, admits that the instrument set out in the complaint in regard to sale of shares of stock in the Press Publishing company was executed and that \$1500 was paid on the \$20,000 deal. However, the defendant alleges a form of agreement covering the deal was later submitted by plaintiff for defendant's signature, but defendant has refused to sign the agreement. He states, and he has demanded the \$1500 back to the plaintiff. Plaintiff has refused to accept the \$1500, the answer says, and it is ordered into court. The defendant denies allegations of the complaint in the main except execution of the instrument set out in the complaint and that \$1500 was paid as down payment.

Circuit Judge George R. Duncan ordered a direct verdict in favor of the defendant Friday afternoon in the case of Cornelius Price Long vs. being a habitual criminal and instructed the jury to state in its verdict that Long was not the man which the information stated had committed the four felonies on which the information was based. Defense counsel in asking for a directed verdict set up the contention that the state had waived its right to file an information under the habitual criminal act when it failed to press the charge at the time Long was on trial for receiving from the state penitentiary. Defense counsel contended that at the time Long was on trial for such crime, the prosecution knew of the other crimes now alleged against Long and by its failure to file the habitual criminal information at that time lost its right to do so later. District Attorney Miller Hayden indicated he would take an appeal to the supreme court.

Farm Loans to 22 Veterans

Thirty percent of the approximately 2000 service men who are being returned to civilian life in Oregon monthly have indicated an interest in the farm. And in view of the fact that farm lands have reached a price higher than was the case at the close of the first World War, the problem is a difficult one for those agencies which have been assigned the job of placing the soldier and the sailor who feel they can make a living on the land. This was the statement Thursday noon of Walter Duffy, regional director of the farm security administration for the northwest during an address before the Salem Lions club.

The situation is complicated by reason of the release of thousands of war industry workers who, too, are seeking security on the land, Duffy said. So far, the SFA has made 22 loans to veterans under conditions which call for repayment over a 40-year period. The amount of money loaned is based on the estimated earning power of the land which is being purchased.

Duffy asked for an understanding between the farmer and the business man, pointing out their interests are common. It was announced during the luncheon that the 4H club show and fat stock auction will be held at the state fairgrounds September 5 and 6. This is a project sponsored by the Salem Lions club.

Picks Committee On City Salaries

Mayor I. M. Doughton today announced his appointments on the special committee of aldermen and citizens at large who will make a study of the city salary question and return a report for consideration next year when the 1946-47 budget is compiled.

On the committee are Aldermen G. F. Chambers, chairman, Lewis Mitchell and Albert H. Gilie; and citizens at large, I. N. (Ike) Bacon, who is commander of Capital post, American Legion; W. W. Rosebraugh, ex-alderman and manufacturer; W. W. Chadwick, ex-mayor, member of the legislature and hotel operator; and Karl Heinlein, manager of Oregon Pulp & Paper company.

The committee was authorized at the city council meeting Monday night, July 2, when a number of salaries and pay scales were raised proportionately to other increases that had been made in the 1945-46 budget. Amendment of the budget ordinance was necessary to make the increases at the July 2 meeting.

Although the weather bureau's 12:30 temperature reading Friday afternoon was 81.6, the observer expressed the opinion that the mercury would reach a maximum of 90 degrees before sunset. If his prediction proves correct, this would make the ninth consecutive day with maximum temperatures of 90 degrees or over. Thursday's maximum was 95 degrees while the high point for the series came last Saturday when the mercury reached 100 even.

Marion County Barely Meets Its E-Bonds Sale Quota

Marion county ranked as 17th county in the state in sale of E bonds, according to figures given out today from war finance headquarters as received from the state committee, just scaling over the quota by four-tenths of one percent with total E bond sales of \$2,280,079. The quota allotted this county was \$2,270,000. Reports sent in by the committee here on E bond sales showed a total of \$2,154,426, or below the quota, but the state committee added \$125,560 as the county's proportion of army-navy sales which brought the aggregate to 100.4 percent of the quota and kept its record intact.

Complete county totals have not yet been given out but are expected to be released by the end of the week.

Probe Plot at Hollywood

Washington, July 13 (AP)—The house committee on un-American activities decided today to send an investigation to the Pacific coast immediately to check on reports of subversive activities there.

Meeting for the first time with their new chairman, Rep. Wood (D., Ga.), the committee agreed, however, to send only a representative to the area, and not to go itself.

"We will await word from our man, and if he indicates further action is needed we will take it," Wood said. "Meanwhile, we aren't going to get all excited about these reports until we know there is a basis for them."

Wood added that he did not plan any meetings for the committee until fall and said a determination would be made then whether or not to hold hearings.

Other members said the committee had received many pleas, particularly from California, for an investigation. Rep. Rankin (D., Miss.), has stated that a "gigantic plot to overthrow the government" is underway in Hollywood.

Wood, who was elected yesterday to succeed Rep. Hart (D., N. J.), as chairman, pledged earlier that he would make a "fearless but fair" investigation of reported subversive elements in the nation.

U. S. Control to Move to Berlin

Berlin, July 13 (AP)—The United States section of the allied control commission for Germany has moved its forward headquarters to Berlin from Frankfurt on the Main, it was announced officially tonight.

The British section will move here shortly.

Gen. Eisenhower's deputy on the control commission, Lt. Gen. Lucius Clay, will have his permanent office in Berlin. Frankfurt will continue to be headquarters for United States army forces in the European theater.

American and British occupation zones will start receiving food from western Germany next week.
