Dallas Opens Swim Campaign

Dallas—Swimming lessons for children between the ages of 9 and 14 will be conducted at the Dallas city park pool, starting Monday, July 16, and continuing through July 28, Ed Gilmore, Dallas Cub Scoutmaster, has announced.

Through arrangements of Gilmore and Mrs. A. J. Cleveland, executive secretary of the Polk county Red Cross chapter, the course of instruction will be given by Mrs. Arne Pederson, Red Cross trained swimming instructor, and will be available to all children whose parents wish them to take advantage of the opportunity. The first class will be limited to 40 pupils, the maximum that one instructor can handle.

The classes will be held six evenings each week in a portion of the swimming pool marked off and designated for the use of the swimming class.

Immunization Clinic Slated at Monmouth

Monmouth—Because of a recent case of diphtheria in this area, the Polk County Health department is offering a special immunization clinic to be held at the Monmouth training school July 19, from 10 to 12 a. m.

Immunization and vaccination will be offered to any child over six months of age. Booster doses for diphtheria immunization are recommended for any child who has not been immunized within the last four years. Re-vaccination for smallpox is recommended every six years.

Lutheran Conference Arranged for Colton

Silverton—Many local folk from the three large Lutheran parishes, Trinity, Immanuel, and Calvary, plan to attend the American Lutheran conference at Colton during the coming week.

The conference is composed of 14 synods, the Norwegian Lutheran, the Augustina synod, the American Lutheran church, the United Danish Lutheran church, and the Lutheran Free church.

Study and recreational programs are featured each day of week with special Sunday programs of devotionals, music and addresses.

Monmouth—Monmouth school board met and decided to grant points for educational work done in the service. Three diplomas of graduation were awarded to service boys, John Lorence, seaman 1/c; James Chatzauk, sergeant in the air corps, and Leonard Buell, discharged veteran of the infantry.

Mt. Angel Has Blood Worries

Mt. Angel—The blood bank chairman, Anton Traeger, and Peter Gores, general Red Cross chairman, voiced the fear of the danger of falling short of the registrations for the next Red Cross blood bank, which will be here July 19, at the luncheon and business meeting conducted by the club president, William Bean, Tuesday noon.

The suggestion of Leonard Fisher that all business houses raise their flags Wednesday to proclaim it "blood registration day" was accepted, as it was hoped to arouse the community to the need of taking time out to give their blood, despite the heat and exceedingly busy season.

Visiting servicemen included Pvt. Alvin May, Pfc. Donald Butsch, Pfc. Virgil Lowrie and James Bourbonnais, radarman 3/c, and they told of instances in their own experiences where blood plasma had been of vital importance. The three army men were members of Patton's Third army and recently returned home from Germany for redeployment. The navy man, Bourbonnais, was serving on PT boats which, he said, patrolled the beaches at night and looked for small Japanese vessels.

May told of their advance through Cologne and the Ruhr pocket and told of an instance of a serviceman in his group who had his leg blown off by stepping on a mine. At that time only three vials of blood plasma were available, and probably because of the shortage he died. May said he hopes to donate his blood July 19. Butsch, who served as motor messenger, told of another serviceman whose case was considered hopeless and was given plasma in both arms, and in 12 hours was sitting up and talking.

Lowrie, who is from Hubbard, was visiting here with his buddies, and also told of the need for blood plasma.

Evergreen District History Planned

The Evergreen school is thought to be the oldest rural school in the state that has remained intact since its origin which was sometime prior to the Civil War. Year-Round Farm Jobs Need Filling

Dallas—Fifteen year-round dairy jobs are open in Polk county at present, according to Ray Kliever, farm labor assistant. This shortage of labor is serious and if help isn't secured some dairies will have to quit. Any qualified person who wants a good year-round job with security, paying from \$135 to \$175 per month, should call at the farm labor office in Dallas or Independence. In cases house, lights, water, wood, milk and eggs are furnished in addition to salary.

Farm help is solicited on a year-round basis by the labor office. Any person wishing to do farm work should call the farm labor office, stating what kind of work they want and how long they can work.

Fire Protection Contract Signed

Albany—Residents of Albany, through their city council, became legally responsible Wednesday for the protection of property in the newly organized Northern Benton county rural fire district within limitation of a contract which the council authorized the mayor and recorder to sign.

The contract was entered into mutually by the city officials and the directors of the new district. It obligates the city to provide such reasonable protection as is within its power without jeopardizing the safety of property lying within the city limits of Albany, in return for which the fire district agrees to pay the \$1200. The agreement covers a period of 12 months.

Jefferson—A Veterans of Foreign Wars post has been organized in Jefferson, and a charter granted. A name has not yet been chosen, but the post will be instituted some time in August.
