Polk Doubles Quota of Bonds

Dallas—Sales of bonds in the seventh war loan in Polk county reached \$1,540,806, practically doubling the \$786,000 county quota, according to official release July 7, from the state war finance committee announced by E. J. Page, county chairman of the war finance committee.

E bond sales had attained \$344,165, 76.4 percent of the assigned \$450,000 quota, by the closing date.

Sales of other series other than E bonds were reported for the county as follows: F, \$6941; G, \$49,000; C, \$173,600; C of I, \$554,100; 1 1/2 percent, \$304,000; 2 1/2 percent, \$92,500; 2 1/2 percent, \$16,500.

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Linn Welfare To Lift Income

Albany—How to make about \$375,000 of prospective income for the 1945-46 fiscal year meet requirements estimated at \$450,000 is the problem which confronts the Linn county public welfare department, it was announced by Mrs. Ruth Cotter, newly appointed county administrator, who, however, expressed conviction that the welfare service will find a solution.

Mrs. Cotter explained that, while the Linn county budget committee did not reduce its welfare allowances for the 1945-46 year below those of the past year, the county's estimated needs for the coming year are \$14,376 higher.

Inasmuch as funds contributed by the county are only from 15 to 20 per cent of the total amount expended for social service the overall deficit will be approximately \$75,000.

The increasing need was explained by the administrator as due to several factors, including not only higher living costs that clients must meet, but to general population growth, to the increasingly large number of persons who reach the age of 65 and become eligible for old age assistance and to the rapidly growing number of abandoned, neglected or orphaned children who share in the aid to dependent children fund.

Meanwhile the number of persons who are unemployable through illness or physical disabilities remains unrecuded.
