

War Quota Hit By Monmouth

Monmouth — Final seventh war loan figures show total bond sales in Monmouth of \$96,400.80, with \$39,787.50 in E bonds and \$2,000 credited to Monmouth by the Standard Oil company.

Staff members of the Oregon College of Education exceeded their quota by 46.7 per cent by purchasing a total of \$7,017.22 as against their quota of \$4,781.26. The First National bank also stretched its quota by approximately 15 per cent when it sold a total of \$909.13, a figure subject to revision by the Federal Reserve bank, since some bonds sold out of town may be credited here, according to Charles C. Powell, president.

While no local E bond quota was set, the Monmouth total goal was \$40,000. On July 5 the state committee credits Polk county with total sales of \$1,533,737, which surpasses the county quota by 195.1 per cent, second highest in the state, with Hood River county leading. E bond sales in Polk county were only 76.4 per cent of the quota of \$450,000. County purchases were \$344,165.

Albany News Boy Sets Bond Record

Albany—Although Linn county met but 92.2 per cent of its E bond quota in the seventh war loan campaign, sales of bonds of all types amounted to \$2,834,490, or 177 per cent of the overall quota, according to final Federal Reserve bank figures received by Harold Faris, county war finance chairman.

Notable in the drive was the record of Billy Cheek, 15-year-old former Democrat-Herald carrier boy, who sold \$50,000 worth of E bonds, about one-eighth of Albany's E bond sales, and \$31,000 worth in other types for a total of \$81,000. Cheek's achievement, said Faris, ranks among the best in the state, adults included.
