

Hugh Rossan Urges Action Before Lebanon Lions Club

Lebanon—Greater recognition by local communities of the tremendous problems posed in assisting returning veterans to adjust themselves easily to civilian life was urged by the Lebanon Lions club meeting Wednesday noon by Hugh Rossan, director of the newly-created state department of veteran affairs.

Rossan, who outlined salient features of the GI bill of rights, declared that the problem is not one the community can pass on to government agencies and if citizens ignore their responsibilities, he warned that the problem would remain unsolved.

The community is obligated to help the veteran find employment, he said, and the employer should give the problem intelligent thought and try to create new jobs.

Appealing to his audience to get down to fundamentals and organize action before the problem breaks, Rossan said governmental action in the form of the GI bill of rights was a

Albany Road Is Refaced

Albany—When work in progress on the Albany-Lebanon road, known as the Crawford road, a county thoroughfare, is completed it will probably render this road the main highway between the two towns, in the opinion of Linn county court members.

The work involves straightening and widening and some resurfacing, effect of which will be not only the speeding of traffic but the reduction of the distance between the two towns by several miles.

It was pointed out that this road, which parallels to a great extent the Albany-Lebanon branch of the Southern Pacific railway, will probably be preferred not only because of its economy of mileage but also because it will bear little if any logging traffic.

The road enters Albany via Hackleman's grove.

Page Reveals E Bond Sales

Dallas—Final report of bond sales in Polk county, released by E. J. Page, county chairman, reveal the county's percentage at 205.9 per cent, with total sales amounting to \$1,618,673, against a quota of \$786,000. In the state Polk was one of two counties to double its quota and was second in total sales recorded, topped only by Hood River county.

With total E bond sales of \$396,432, Polk county attained 88.1 per cent of its \$450,000 quota, giving it 27th place in county standing in the state. The sales in E bonds exceeded those of the sixth and fifth war loan drives, where lower quotas were topped. Totals in the sixth war loan reached \$361,800 and the fifth, \$371,600.

The total of all bond sales in the seventh war loan was the highest yet made in the county, exceeding by \$150,000 the sixth war loan, which, with sales of \$1,454,300, topped the assigned quota by 234.6 per cent. Final totals in the fifth loan were \$991,700.

Concluding totals for all series purchased in Polk county in the seventh war loan are: E, \$393,432; F, \$6,941; G, \$74,600; C, \$173,600; 1½ per cent, \$554,000; 1½ per cent, \$304,000; 2½ per cent, \$92,500; 2½ per cent, \$16,500.
