Farmers Seek Flood Control

Albany—Initial steps toward formation of Linn county's first flood control district are being undertaken by residents of that portion of the county lying along the North Santiam river opposite Stayton, where this stream has been making serious incursions into its banks, destroying much farm land.

The movement was initiated after Roy Clark, U.S. engineer, had consulted with the county court Thursday regarding the possibility of the court undertaking responsibility for maintenance of riprap along the bank if the government should complete revetment construction, for which, he said, \$50,000 has been allocated.

The court found that it would not be feasible for the county to take over the project, but it was pointed out that a flood control district, for which legal provision exists, could well assume this responsibility, organizing along lines similar to those involved in formation of rural fire protection districts, and encompassing the areas benefited to the exclusion of disinterested areas.
