Sheriff Raids Lake Resort

Albany—Two men were arrested during a raid on the Colorado Lake resort Saturday and warrants were issued for the arrest of two more as the result of complaints that gambling and liquor law violations were current there. The resort is situated on the old Albany-Corvallis highway. Arrested were Roy Taylor, lessor of the grounds, and Clifford Hopkins, the former charged with possession of gambling games and the latter with conducting games. Taylor was released under \$500 bond and Hopkins was freed on putting up \$250. Hearings are yet to be set.

The raid was conducted by Sheriff H. A. Southard, Deputy Sheriff George Miller, State Officer Jack Lott and Tom Stevenson, state liquor commission operative.

Two soldiers, D. E. Myers, and A. R. Erdman, are charged with illegal sale of liquor, also at the resort. They are named on warrants but had not been picked up late Monday.

Sheriff Southard said that information which prompted the raid was furnished by army officers.

The raiding officers picked up three slot machines, a dice table, chuck-a-luck cage, blackjack table, playing cards and several other gambling devices, all held as evidence.
