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Two Survive First Family

The annual reunion of descendants of William and Elmira McCleure Looney, and Nelson R. Doty and Elmira Looney Doty was held Sunday, July 22 on the W. E. Doty farm five miles northwest of Jefferson; part of the donation land claim that his father, Nelson Doty, homesteaded in 1846.

William Looney, his wife, Elmira McCleure Looney, and five children started from Springfield, Missouri, in the spring of 1849, on the Oregon trail. From California they came by boat to Portland, Ore., and then by ox teams to the home of a brother, Jesse Looney, at Looney Butte, who crossed the plains in 1843.

William Looney was drowned when he fell from a horse while attempting to cross the Santiam river.

His widow, Elmira McCleure Looney, married Nelson Ransom Doty of Rochester, N.Y., who came to Oregon in 1844, and took an active part in the Cayuse Indian war. He was the first justice of the peace in southern Marion county, and owned the first tannery, and made the first shoes and saddles in Marion county.

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
