Fire Fighting Demonstrated

Albany—Fire Chief Don Hayne and volunteer Chief Charles Rawlings staged a demonstration of the new Albany rural fire truck for the benefit of residents of the Fairmount school district, which is included within the newly formed northern Benton county rural fire protection district.

Spectators also received instruction on assisting firemen in quelling flames that may be ignited within the district, either in fields or in buildings.

President Harold Rumbaugh of the rural fire district board of directors said Saturday that these demonstrations, a series of which is planned, are being held to enable residents of the fire protection district the better to cope with fires and therefore to protect their property more effectively from damage than would be possible with an entirely green crew of fighters.

Demonstrations have been arranged for the Richland district, Tuesday night; at North Albany, Wednesday night; at Oak Grove, Thursday night, and Fir Grove, Friday night.

Sewage Plant Survey Grows

Monmouth—Fred Maryfield, associate professor of civil engineering at Oregon State college, reports continuation of the stream pollution survey started last year as a preliminary step to establishment of sewage disposal plants, will be carried on this season with additional cities and no more phases of the problem. The last legislature made available additional funds for this work; a cooperative project with other state and federal agencies.

Cities participating in the survey for the first time are Brownsville, Carlton, Coos Bay, Monmouth, Myrtle Point and Ontario. Cities participating last year were Albany, Corvallis, Eugene, Gladstone, Harrisburg, Hood River, Lebanon, Milton, Mount Angel, McMinnville, Newberg, Oregon City, Pendleton, Salem, St. Helens, Sheridan, Springfield, The Dalles, West Linn and West Salem.

This year's study will include a more intensive survey of canyons and other industrial wastes, sampling of all parts of the Willamette river and tributaries, and sampling of water in the Cottage Grove and Fern Ridge reservoirs in cooperation with the federal fish and wildlife service, states Maryfield, who is heading the research study.
