Albany Drops Plans For Sewage Survey

Albany—While plans are being made to resume the sewage survey which was launched last year through co-operation of Oregon State college, according to reports received here, it is doubtful if Albany will be included again. Mayor G. C. Knodel said Monday.

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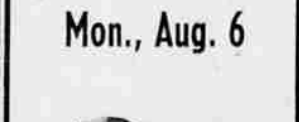


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
