Springfield Plant Will be Auxiliary

Seattle, Aug. 1 (AP)—Officials of the Casen Plywood company said today that their new Springfield, Ore., plant will be an auxiliary to the company's plant in Seattle, but would not replace it.

The new \$200,000 Springfield plant was established because the plywood industry "gradually is shifting to Oregon," said C. S. Leonardson, western manager of the company.

"But we definitely are not moving our plant from Seattle," he said.

Bradley's Army Demobilized

Wiesbaden, Aug. 1 (AP)—Gen. Omar N. Bradley's famed 12th army group, which at one time numbered 1,233,000 soldiers to form the greatest war machine in American military history, has ceased to function.

Organized approximately a year ago, its operations stopped late last night.

It was former back in the days when American troops in the Cotentin peninsula had cracked German defenses along the St. Lo-Perriers road and surged into central France.

In its year of battle, the 12th had 416,406 battle casualties, with 74,237 killed and 297,509 wounded. There were 44,660 others listed as missing or captured. But Bradley's troops captured 2,500,000 Germans and killed or wounded an estimated 500,000.

The 12th became operational on Aug. 1, 1944, with two armies, the First under Gen. Courtney H. Hodges, and the third under Gen. George S. Patton, Jr.

Laski Outlines Program for 'Common Man' in Britain

London, Aug. 1 (AP)—Prof. Harold J. Laski, chairman of the labor party's national executive committee, proclaimed today "the era of the common man" in Britain.

He said in an interview that labor's sweeping victory in the general election held as much economic and social significance of the emergence of the middle class in England in the 1830's.

"This is the arrival of the people in power," Laski stated. "We are now prepared to give the little man—within the framework of the British constitution—all the progressive change that he requires."

Laski spoke with authority, for he heads the policy making body of the labor party.

On foreign policy, he said: "Our first great task is the utter defeat of the Japanese. Before the most pressing of our domestic problems we intend to fulfill our maximum obligations in the far east."

With particular reference to Spain, he added: "We do not believe democracy and fascism can live side by side in our independent world, and we do not think democracy is compatible with absolute monarchies."

Laski said the labor party abhorred any system of government "in which a small class, living by privilege, tries to exploit, as in Spain it has exploited for centuries, the mass of the community."

Laski asserted that the first objective in the labor party's program of nationalization would be the acquisition of the 250-year-old Bank of England.

"You can't plan economically without control of the central bank," he said.

The next nationalization effort would be directed at the coal mining industry, Laski said, then would come transport, followed by the iron and steel industry.

A half dozen employees of the Southern Pacific company at Albany donated as well as many from the Keith Brown company of Salem. Producers Co-op of Salem was represented by eight donors while Western Paper Converting, Ladd & Bush, Montgomery Ward, and the lumber division of Oregon Pulp and Paper listed contributors. Newport and Stayton each sent 7 while Sweet Home sent 4.

51 Inches of Rain in July

Rainfall for July was .51 inches, or approximately one-fifth over the normal amount for the month, bringing the total precipitation for the first seven months of the year to 26.09 inches as compared with the normal amount of 20.54 inches for the same period. The month was the wettest since 1942 when the rainfall was .92 inch. There were only .05 inch in July 1944 and .32 inch in 1943. Most of the month's precipitation occurred July 23 when 4.2 inch was recorded.

Only four times has the rainfall for July exceeded the one-inch mark, the greatest being 2.72 inches in 1916 followed by 1.96 inches in 1909; 1.81 inches in 1902 and 1.21 inches in 1923. Since 1893 there have been eleven Julys without rainfall, the last of these being 1933. In addition three Julys had only sufficient moisture to record as a trace.

Temperature for the month was above normal, the mean average being 68.2 degrees as compared with the normal of 66.7 degrees. The hottest day of the month was July 7 with 100 degrees, registered during an 8-day period when temperatures of 90 degrees or above occurred. Coolest day of the month was July 30 with a minimum temperature of 43 degrees, eleven degrees above freezing. July had 20 clear days, six part cloudy and five cloudy days.

Blow Torch Repulses Army of Black Ants

Pontiac, Mich., Aug. 1 (AP)—An army of black ants, marching in perfect battle formation in columns six inches wide and 30 feet long, had been repulsed with terrific loss today after attempting to invade the home of Gunnard Turnquist in Bloomfield township.

Turnquist said that after standing "frozen in my tracks" for a few seconds when the ant army marched into his kitchen yesterday, he went into action with a blow torch "flame-thrower" and turned the tide of battle after a broom and lead arsenate counterattack had failed.

The battle ended after one and one-half hours and the death toll, he said, was more than 40,000.

London Stocks Break

London, Aug. 1 (AP)—A fresh break in the stock market occurred today after Prof. Harold J. Laski, chairman of the labor party's national executive committee, broadcast to American that socialization of the Bank of England would be one of the first points of the labor program.

Greatest Munitions Shipping Point Operated at Caven Point

New York, Aug. 1 (AP)—The army disclosed today that the greatest munitions shipping point in the world operated secretly throughout the European war within three miles of New York City skyscrapers. The \$17,000,000 secret pier is at Caven Point, N. J., only half a mile south of the Statue of Liberty.

In a "now-it-can-be-told" statement, the New York port of embarkation disclosed the pier's identity as the last of 1800 ammunition ships sailed from the terminal.

Its load brought the total ammunition shipped during the past three years of 2,696,811 tons, ranging from six ton blockbusters to loose powder, with only one fire to mar its safety record.

Port authorities said the terminal was "one of America's best kept secrets of the war."

It will now be classed as an ammunition port unless "future developments compel its use as such," the war department said. It took 54,000 freight cars, rolling down the 2200 foot causeway to the 1800 foot pier to load the ships with their fighting cargo. It took an average staff of 2000 civilians and 1000 military personnel, plus 11,000 stevedores on call, to serve the giant installation, the largest of its kind in the world.

Ceremonies marked the departure of the last ship, and the first time that the pier was open to the public. As Maj. Gen. Clarence H. Helms, commanding general of the port, and Col. John U. Schless, commanding officer of the terminal, stood by, Caven Point's red danger flag was hauled down.

Veteran of Nazi Prisons

Greatest personal grievance against the Germans were the needless little inconveniences experienced in several prison camps, First Lt. Douglas Farmer, shot down following a raid over Berlin last August 6, told the Kiwanis club Tuesday in connection with his nine months as prisoner in several camps. One camp had a water faucet for 250 men and another two faucets for 5000 men.

Time passed fast considering everything, he said, with a major portion of the food supply in many instances being provided by the American Red Cross and an opportunity to trade with German civilians.

Lt. Farmer, pilot of a B-17 with the Eighth air force, was on his 29th raid. After dumping the bomb load he had started the return home when flak knocked out an engine, damaged the oil lines while over the North sea, and forced him to return back over the mainland, losing his other three engines with one catching fire. The 10-man crew bailed out from 9000 to 2500 feet and he landed in a cow pasture, being taken prisoner a short time later. None of the crew were injured but the four officers were sent to one camp and the enlisted personnel to another.

Prices in Shanghai Skyrocketing

Chungking, Aug. 1 (AP)—Prices in Shanghai have skyrocketed to the point where a glass of brandy costs 200,000 puppet Chinese dollars, Central News agency reported today.

A preserved California orange brings 500,000 dollars and the first bowl of rice in a restaurant sells for approximately 1600 dollars. By the time the customer is ready to eat the second bowl of rice, the price has climbed to 1,800 dollars.

The new China Daily said morale was declining rapidly among Japanese soldiers in Shanghai.

Canada to Welcome Marshal Alexander

Ottawa, Aug. 1 (AP)—Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King says the appointment of Field Marshal Sir Harold Alexander as governor-general of Canada "will be warmly welcomed in all parts of our country and by none more than by the members of Canada's armed forces, many of whom served under his command."

Roseburg Rifle Range Will Move
Washington, Aug. 1 (AP)—The Roseburg, Ore., rifle range will be transferred from the war department to the office of defense plants under a bill signed by President Truman.

Land will be acquired elsewhere for a target range, said the ODP, which took over the site as part of a sawmill property tract.

Army Moves to Aid Railroads

Washington, Aug. 1 (AP)—The army moved in two directions today to avert a transportation crisis but came under renewed fire from its plans to keep 7,000,000 men in uniform for the Pacific war.

To ease the pressure on railroads resulting from troop movements, the war department said:

1. It is turning over to commercial air lines enough army planes and pilots to move 25,000 troops a month across the country by air.

2. It is speeding up the discharge of high-point soldiers with railroad experience "to the maximum extent consistent with military needs and the orderly process of redeployment."

Meanwhile, Senator Johnson (D., Colo.) intended that the army is keeping too many soldiers in uniform above its real needs. He prepared to tell his colleagues that unless the army speeds demobilization the nation may see a post-war "dumping" of manpower that will mean serious unemployment.

Johnson, a member of the senate military committee, voiced his contention while a top administration official was telling another reported that 7,000,000 men seem to him "a helluva big army for the one-front war."

This official, who expressed his views on the understanding he would not be quoted by name, added that "I think there will be increasing pressure on the army to release more men."
