Work Started On New Ferry

Independence — According to H. H. Brandt, Polk county commissioner of Independence, work will start this week on the building of a new ferry to replace the present ferry operating across the Willamette river between Polk and Marion counties at Independence.

The new ferry boat will be 65 feet in length or five feet longer than the old ferry. It will be 18 feet in width and will accommodate eight automobiles. Timbers now here, to be used in the construction, were specially sawed for the boat and were brought from the Booth-Kelly Lumber company near Eugene. The timbers are 64 feet in length and will run the full length of the ferry. The cabins of the old ferry will be rebuilt and used on the new structure and the electric motors will be moved from the old to the new boat.

The approaching aprons will not be attached to the new ferry but will be a part of the shore landing apparatus and will be so constructed that they can be easily moved for low and high water.

Mr. Brandt stated that he expected the new ferry would be completed within the next 30 days but the motors would not be removed from the old ferry until after the hop harvest season so that service would not be interrupted during that time.

The Abderhalden boy was shot in the back by a neighbor boy at the neighbor's home after the two had got the .22 rifle from an upstairs room to go squirrel hunting. Frank had headed back downstairs when his companion touched the trigger while trying to put on the safety.

Rushed by ambulance to the hospital, it was found that the bullet had penetrated his right kidney and lodged in the liver. He was given a blood transfusion and is being treated with sulfa drugs and penicillin, but at last reports the bullet was still in the boy's body.
