

Rainiers Cut Lead to Four

Seattle's lapping Rainiers, almost woefully out of the running a week ago for the 1945 Pacific coast league flag, were back in the thick of the fight today after taking the first-place Portland Beavers over the hurdles five tilts out of six in a series to be concluded tonight.

The Rainiers pulled within four games of the pacesetter by sweeping a Sunday twin bill, 6-2 and 5-2, after dropping Saturday's encounter, 11-1.

San Francisco's Seals took a firm grip on fourth place three games in front of Oakland by beating the Acorns three times over the week-end, copping Saturday's game, 4-0 behind Big Bob Joyce and grabbing both ends of yesterday's doubleheader, 7-4 and 8-2.

San Francisco moved within three games of the Oaks by shading the Sacramento Solons four out of seven, winning Saturday, 4-3, and splitting Sunday's double feature, 4-2 and 2-9.

Hollywood recouped after a bad start against the Los Angeles Angels to break even, 4-4, in their series. The Stars took three straight during the week-end, slaughtering the Seraphs 18-0 Saturday and continuing yesterday, 7-3 and 8-3, to draw within two games of seventh place.

Seattle beat Portland's leading pitcher, Don Pulford, in yesterday's curtain raiser with Southpaw Glen Elliott getting credit for the win. The Beavers got off to an early two-run lead in the first frame on Frank Demaree's homer with one aboard, but were unable to score in the succeeding innings. The Rainiers sent Pulford to the showers in the seventh with a four-run rally touched off by Charley Aleno's circuit clout, and then added two more in the ninth off Relief Hurler Ad Liska.

Stockholm, Aug. 13 (AP)—Sweden, already the possessor of the world's two fastest distance runners, unveiled another speedster in its national championship track meet.

Lennart Strand, an unheralded athlete, scored a terrific upset yesterday by defeating Arne Andersson, Sweden's second-ranked runner, for the 1500-meter title.

Strand was clocked in 3:47.3, four and three-tenths seconds off Gunder Haegg's world mark of 3:43.

The great Gunder ran only in the 5000-meter event and won easily in 14:29, considerably over his record of 13:58.2.

Howard to Coach OSC Backfield

Corvallis, Ore., Aug. 13 (AP)—A former University of Southern California and professional footballer, Bill Howard, will coach the Oregon State college backfield for the coming season.

In announcing Howard's appointment, Athletic Director Percy P. Loeck said it was subject to approval of the Oregon state board of higher education.

Howard was a hard-driving fullback on the Trojan teams of 1933, 1934 and 1935. In 1936 he served his alma mater as freshman coach and in 1937 and 1938 Howard played professional ball. He was backfield coach for the Detroit Lions in 1939-40.

Well, the fans evidently assumed that a riot had occurred at the end of the game as Edwards went to his quarters with "Frisco" being handled roughly, but rejoicing soon turned into pathos, as the announcer gave the word that Edwards would not appear in the second game as Mrs. Edwards had been stricken seriously ill and that umpire was bringing her back to Salem.

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Tobin Makes Tiger Debut

Jim Tobin, veteran hurler who travelled the waiver route from Boston to Detroit—switching from the National league to the American—may be a vital cog in the Tigers' bid for the junior major league pennant which they won in 1940 and nearly won last year.

Tobin, making his American league debut yesterday before 53,189 paid—the second largest Detroit crowd of the season—pitched and batted to triumph in one game of a twin Tiger defeat of the New York Yankees, 9-6 and 8-2.

Obtained only a week ago from the sixth place Boston Braves, Tobin not only confounded the Yanks through three scoreless frames of the 11-inning first game, but blasted a three-run homer that broke a 6-6 tie.

Hal Newhouse's six-hit effort in the finale brought the ace left-hander his 18th triumph of the year. Hank Greenberg starred at bat for the Bengals. His five hits, including a double and triple, accounted for six runs in the two games.

The Senators won the opener from the St. Louis Browns 9-5 to keep pace with the Tigers, behind Bob Muncie, annexed the second contest, 4-1.

The Chicago Cubs stretched their first place National league lead to 6½ games via a double win over the lowly Phillies, 4-3 and 12-6. Phil Cavarretta, Cub first baseman and leading hitter, hurt his right shoulder in a collision and left the first game.

After losing second place to Brooklyn by virtue of the Dodgers' 7-3 opening game victory, the St. Louis Cardinals came back to win the second game 3-0 and regain their hold on the runner-up position.

Manager Mel Ott provided a one-man show at the Polo grounds, as he personally accounted for both the New York Giants triumph over the Cincinnati Reds, with game winning homers in each contest.

His opening game round tripper gave the Giants a 3-2 edge while in the nightcap, he walloped a pinch-hit three-run four bagger to put his team out in front 6-5. Van Mungo gained his 12th triumph in the first game, while Ace Adams, making his 50th appearance, won his ninth in the second.

Nurnberg, Germany, Aug. 13 (AP)—Cpl. Billy Conn swore he was the happiest soldier in Germany today.

Belling Billy, the heavyweight boxer who rates top priority for a heavyweight championship bout with Sgt. Joe Louis after the war, was elated because he has become a piece of "lend-lease" merchandise.

Effective immediately, he is a member of the entertainment troupe headed by comedian Bob Hope and will stay with the group for the remainder of their European tour.

After that he expects a September furlough home to his wife and family in Pittsburgh. Then he probably will return to Europe with a large group of servicemen boxers who will make an extended tour under the tutelage of Capt. Newton Cox, former middleweight college champion of the southern conference, of Baltimore.

The 27-year-old Conn, who has been in service about three and a half years and overseas 14 months, has given 325 exhibitions for servicemen.

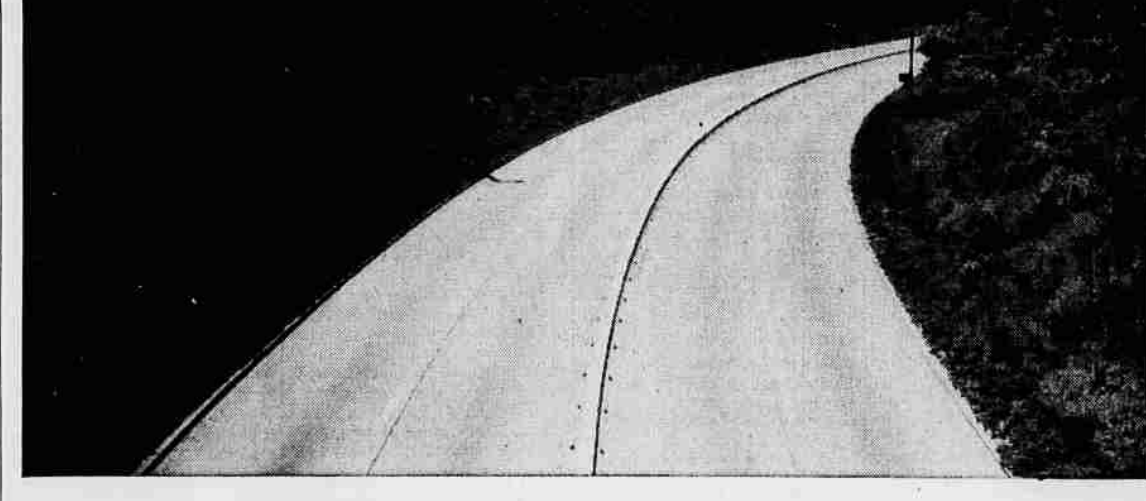
"They're called exhibitions but half the guys I meet try to knock my brains out to make a reputation for themselves," Conn said. "One Mexican named Costello Caruso almost turned the trick during an exhibition at Rheims when he landed a punch on my jaw immediately after we shook hands."

Conn said that he was "out" on his feet for a second or two and "when I recovered, I knocked him stiff."
