Dallas—Most local industries and stores resumed operations Thursday after closing Tuesday immediately following V-J announcement. Remaining closed Thursday were the Willamette Valley Lumber company, federal and county offices.

Dallasites celebrated the victory news jubilantly and noisily but arrests were few, if any, and there were no jail incarcerations. A street dance, sponsored by Bill Sanders, owner of the Blue Garden confectionery, Tuesday night, attracted celebrants. Linn Millage Taxes Boosted

Albany—Higher millage tax rates are in order for four Linn county cities during the current tax year despite a \$292,286.04 state income tax offset for the county shared by the cities through deduction of school levies. A fifth city probably will also pay a higher millage rate, according to the report of County Assessor W. C. Templeton.

Albany's rate will be 46.9 mills, 5.7 mills higher than last year, due chiefly to the budgeting of \$31,000 for school expansion purposes. Voters of Albany school district No. 5 approved a special tax of \$127,660.92 in comparison with \$69,697.83 last year, increasing the school millage from 12.7 to 20.6.

Brownsville has a millage boost of from 38.7 to 47.7; Halsey from 33.2 to 39.5; and Sodaville from 34 to 43.7. Harrisburg's rate waits determination of the levy for the joint Linn-Lane county school district. The total is expected to be higher because of an increase in the school levy in Harrisburg.

Lebanon, Seio and Sweet Home will enjoy decreases amounting to .5 of a mill, .9 and 4.9 respectively.
