One of the few real wonders of the world, pygmy horses from the Grand Canyon are being shown in Salem from 10 a.m. to 9:30 p.m. by Ernest W. Ritter, artist and explorer, who with a friendly Indian guide, hauled them from the bottom of a steep walled canyon with block and tackle. The little wild horses, made small by inbreeding, lack of water and proper horse food, were discovered several years ago through tales of Indians, handing down folklore of a band of horses which had been trapped in the canyon through the years had become smaller and smaller through lack of proper food and water.
