

Dallas Council Passes Edicts

Dallas — After considerable discussion led by Acting Mayor C. B. Sundberg, councilman-at-large, three ordinances passed final readings at Monday night's council meeting.

No major changes were made in the ordinances, which passed first reading at the last meeting. The sewage disposal ordinance places financing and operation of the proposed sewage disposal plant in charge of the water commission.

The slot machine prohibition ordinance, as read at the last meeting, was enlarged to include punch boards and similar devices.

The amendment to the fire prevention ordinance, pertaining to the accumulation of hazardous materials, gives enforcement authority to the fire marshal after a 24-hour period has been allowed offenders.

A complaint relative to the operation of the Hiebert apartments at the corner of Washington and Church streets, was submitted, discussed and referred to the city attorney for investigation.

Referred to the street commission was a complaint concerning a broken sidewalk on Levens street.

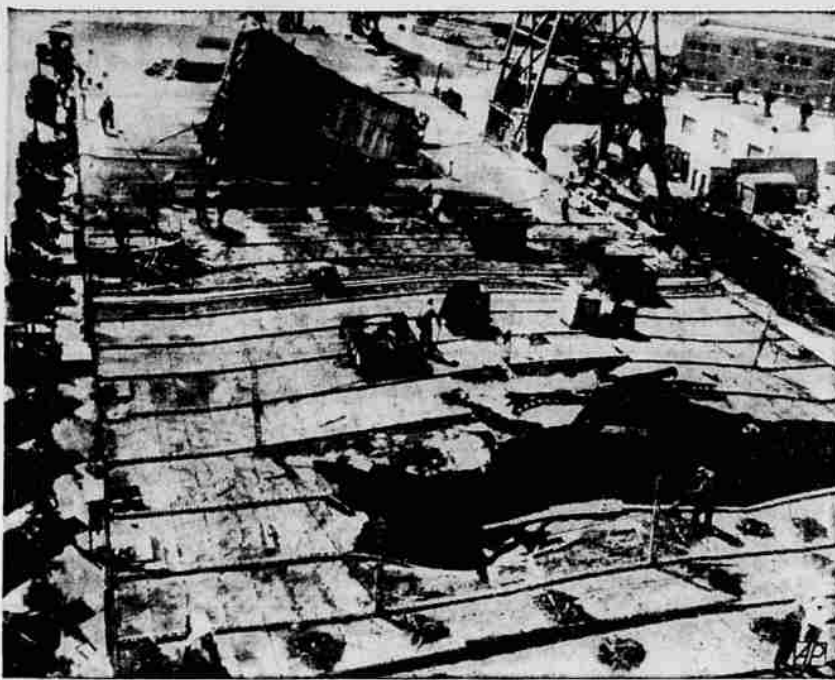
