Replica Made Pioneer House

Fairview — The brick house built on his farm in 1843, in the Wheatland district, by the late pioneer, George Gay, has been preserved in replica by Mr. and Mrs. Howard Stephens, at their home in the Fairview district.

The brick was made from clay on the farm and was in good state of preservation, but time was making inroads on the building. The blueprint of the miniature building, one-sixth the size of the original, was made by Stanley Sargeant, carpenter at Hopewell, and the masonry work was recently completed by Arlie Collins of McMinnville and was entirely from brick salvaged from the house reputed to be the first brick house west of the Rockies, comprising the Oregon Territory, Oregon, Washington, California and Idaho.

An outdoor fireplace and a tiny well with "old oaken bucket" was built near the tiny brick house.
