

Woodburn Park Discussed By Civic Organizations

Woodburn—Shall the city of Woodburn accept the offer of Frank W. Settlemier for a city park and vote a tax for its upkeep and maintenance to raise \$1000 a year, and shall a swimming pool be built there or shall Legion Park be improved and a swimming pool placed at that location? These were the questions discussed at a meeting held at the library Friday night by representatives of the Garden club, Senior and Junior Women's clubs, Chamber of Commerce, fire department and others.

One thing was made clear during the discussion, that wherever the swimming tank is located it will be supported wholeheartedly by everyone.

A. G. Cowan led the discussion in favor of the Settlemier property and quoted Settlemier as stating that the property he offers will be deeded to the city if accepted and the deed put in escrow until the one mill tax is voted to raise the \$1000 per year for maintenance and upkeep. According to Cowan there is room on this property for the swimming tank, soft ball diamond, tennis court and other recreational advantages and it is handier of access to the greater number of people.

Joe Sowa, fire chief, was leader of the discussion in favor of the Legion Park as the proper location with the expenditure of \$3000 for additional ground for the swimming tank. Walter Schuler, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, suggested that the swimming tank be erected as a living memorial to those giving their all in the war and the development be such as to meet the needs of the community for the next 30 or 40 years and favored the ball park as the proper location.

Objections voiced to the Settlemier property were that it is too small for a swimming tank and other facilities and unless the swimming tank is placed there the sum of \$1000 per year is too much for its maintenance. Objections to the ball park were that it is too far from the city and that a fire prove is not as suitable for a park as the ornamental trees on the Settlemier property.

Mrs. Harold Ingram, president of the Garden club, presided over the meeting and among those taking part in the discussions were P. C. McLoughlin, president of the Chamber of Commerce, Mrs. Eugene Stoller, president of the Junior Women's club, Mrs. L. S. Moehl, president of the Senior Women's club, Charles Smith, James Lively, Mrs. Ray Glatt, Cedric Schaff, Dr. J. M. Hanrahan, Mabel Grass of the Woodburn Independent, W. Earl Dunn, Vera Bogard and others.

It was voted that a surveyor be employed to survey the Settlemier property that the public may be informed as to the exact acreage and that the proposed tank and other improvements be entered on the map according to scale before another meeting is held. In order that there may be time for this work the next public meeting has been set for Tuesday, September 4, at Legion hall at 8 p.m. and everyone who has the welfare of Woodburn and the young people of the community at heart is urged to be present at this meeting and voice an opinion on the proposed plans.

Albany Will Close Nursery Project

Albany—The Albany Nursery school council will close the local project September 8, because there is no possibility to secure housing in Albany to continue the project or carry on as a self-supporting enterprise, Mrs. L. G. Lewelling, chairman of the council, announced.

Telegrams and letters have been received stating that the FWA has declined funds for the nursery building.

Lanham act funds, under which the new building was to be erected, are predicated on war needs and therefore FWA is making no additional loans for new buildings and is even cancelling some projects under construction. It was asserted in a telegram from U.S. Senator Wayne Morse to City School Superintendent R. E. McCormack.

Under the present set-up, the council felt that it was no longer feasible to struggle along with the school, McCormack said.

Polk Property Values Lowered

Dallas — Figures compiled in the office of Ed C. Dunn, county assessor, show that assessed valuation of Polk county for 1945-46 dropped but slightly under that of the preceding year, despite heavy valuation loss by fire.

Loss in valuation was set at \$7,495, with total valuation placed at \$12,637,155, as compared with \$12,644,650 in 1944-45. Due to several costly fires, it had been estimated that the county might lose as much as \$100,000, Dunn said, but new construction raised the figure.

The utilities in the county at \$1,520,505 are up \$30,000 over the past year's valuation but will not go over the past year's valuation of \$1,490,860. Total of personal property is valued at \$1,535,230 and real property is valued at \$9,581,420.

All towns in the county except West Salem, Monmouth and Falls City show slight gains in valuation. The Dallas valuation is \$1,489,050, as compared with \$1,412,795 in 1944-45; Independence, \$531,450, as compared with \$529,635; Monmouth, \$332,425, as compared with \$334,370; Falls City, \$114,335, as compared with \$115,750; West Salem, \$540,170, as compared with \$580,145; and Willamina (Polk county share), \$19,580, as compared with \$9,105.

The county's valuation is the lowest this year that it has been since before 1940, except for the year 1943-44, when the army took over the Camp Adair area with the resultant property decrease on the county's tax roll.

Valuation figures since 1940 are as follows: 1941, \$13,065,805; 1942-43, \$13,236,795; 1943-44, \$13,374,555; 1944-45, \$12,495,160; 1945-46, \$12,644,650, and 1946-47, \$12,637,155.
