Dallas—The aeronautics committee of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce has given endorsement to airport recommendations and site selection as outlined in a report recently received from D. N. Harper of the civilian aeronautics administration, according to Edward J. Himes, county engineer and chairman of the committee.

With Harper, Himes inspected six possible sites for an airport, agreed that site G, an area partly within the city limits of

Logging Train Kills Brakeman

Albany—William Skinner, 51, brakeman for the Oregon Electric Railway company, was killed Sunday at 3:25 a.m., when he was struck by a train at Sweet Home, on which he was working. It was stated by Coroner Everett C. Fisher, who investigated the accident, that members of the extra long train crew, who were in the act of setting out cars on the Sweet Home-Dollar camp main line at a switch point on Eighteenth avenue, were contacted by Coroner Fisher.

The witnesses stated that Skinner, who was braking the train, had lined a switch. The fireman said he saw the signal to back up. He missed seeing Skinner again and when he stopped, he found Skinner had been run over by the train when it was backing up.

The body was lying alongside the main line track 20 feet from the switch and 90 feet from 18th avenue crossing, it was stated. Apparently Skinner slipped or tripped on the rails while attempting to cross the tracks to the opposite side of the train.

The body was sent Monday to American Fork, Utah, where funeral services will be held August 30.

The accident victim's wife is employed as a matron at the W.C.T.U. Children's Farm Home, where he also made his home. He was born September 4, 1893, in Scotland and came to the United States 36 years ago. He had lived in La Grande, Ore., before coming here a month ago. He is survived by his widow, two children and seven stepchildren. A son was lost in the war.

Salem Concrete Tile Firm Sued

Dallas — Damages totaling \$25,213.68 plus costs and disbursements are sought in three complaints filed in circuit court here against the Salem Concrete company by plaintiffs involved in an auto accident on the Salem-Dallas highway about two miles west of Salem, August 23, 1943, when a heavy tile or pipe rolled from one of the company's trucks.

The plaintiffs charge that negligence in securing the 1140-pound tile or pipe was responsible for its loosening and rolling onto the highway and against plaintiffs' car, throwing the automobile off its course. The tile or pipe, it is alleged, was on a towed truck.

Alice J. Kosydar, driver of the Plymouth sedan which she alleges was thrown from its course when the tile or pipe rolled onto the highway and against the car, claims she was severely and permanently injured when thrown about inside the car. She demands judgment of \$15,000, costs and disbursements.

Owner of the automobile, Mary Cosgrove, seeks judgment of \$213.68 with costs, for damage to the automobile.

Edward J. Cosgrove, passenger in the auto, demands \$10,000 costs and disbursements, for injuries received as a result of the accident.

Attorneys for the plaintiffs are Earl Conrad and Bruce Spaulding.

West Salem Park Financing Taking Time for Planning

West Salem, Aug. 28—The special industrial committee, composed of city councilmen and officials, has met with the planning and zoning commission to consider the river front Memorial park as proposed by Paul Wallace.

At the last meeting of the council Mayor Guy Newgent delegated this group to the task of preparing a recommendation to offer the council at its next meeting.

Although several recommendations have been offered regarding means of financing acquisition of the Burk property, the committee was unable to formulate definite plans due to the necessity of making a study and investigation of the various proposals. It is understood that Burk will cooperate with withholding the sale of any of the property for a reasonable period.

Mistaken Identity Case Cleared Up

Lebanon — Earl "Spence" Newman, 32, Jefferson, is the man killed in an auto accident which involved four other persons Sunday night at the South Santiam river bridge here—not Earl Spencer, 24, as previously reported.

The mistaken identity occurred when one of the other occupants of the car identified the dead man as "Spence," and a call to Jefferson confirmed the name as "Spencer."

Driver of the auto, Barney Sharp, 18, Jefferson, is unconscious in the Lebanon General hospital but his condition is fairly good, it is reported. X-rays to determine the extent of internal injuries will be taken.

Seven blood transfusions were given Sunday night to the only woman victim of the crash, Doris Sheler, 19, Albany. Her chest is crushed and she is suffering from other internal injuries.

The two other occupants of the car, both from Jefferson, are doing well at the Lebanon hospital. Roy Glenn Wickersham, 16, has fractured ribs and Robert Laurie, 16, is suffering from contusions.

Flood Control Going Ahead

Stayton—Rights-of-way have been obtained, enabling army engineers to proceed with plans for a \$50,000 revetment construction in the North Santiam river flood control project near Stayton island.

The Kingston improvement district, which has been organized to sponsor the government project, obtained the rights-of-way. The project has been delayed because of inability to obtain access through some parcels of land bordering the site. Property owners in the area who have signed rights-of-way easements are Lester Qigley, Kenneth Smith, the Frances M. Kelly estate, Vernon Richter and J. G. Gassner and Eva Spencer, the latter of Linn county.

Condemnation proceedings have been filed against Iva Green in Linn county circuit court, seeking a right-of-way over her land.

The project is planned to control flood waters which in the past have covered farm lands and the Stayton-Kingston road. Specifications call for an eight-foot top with a variable bottom and a channel clearance of 54 feet in width.
